The by-law ratifying the sale of the ulphur spring property at the foot of Dundas street, which will be placed before the City Council for consideration on Monday night, is not quite satisfactory to the purchaser, Mrs. L .M. has been drafted it does not give Mrs. Moorhead the specific right to build anything over the sulphur well, and the purchaser wants the by-law changed to give her the right to enclose the well. She will agree to give the city an easement over the property to the well, but she will not accept the property with any further restrictions that would prevent her from enclosing the well in the building to be erected as a bath-

What the City Council will do with regard to the proposition is not known. Herbert G. Brewer, Employed In Branch of Bank of Montreal, Under Arrest.

TOTAL AMOUNT OF MONEY INVOLVED IS NOT KNOWN

Prisoner Victim Short Time Ago of Forged Check Artist.

Alleged manipulation and falsifying of the books of a branch of the Bank of Montreal here by which he was employed in the capacity of teller, brought the arrest last night and the court appearance to-day of Herbert G. Brewer, 24 years old. Brewer was arraigned before Magistrate Graydon in city court and at the request of Crown At-torney A. M. Judd was remanded to jail for a week without plea or elec-

The amount of money involved is not known at present, but an audit of the bank's books will be made during the week to ascertain the total amount of the defalcations. These are said to have been made up of numerous small amounts. No definite sum is mentioned in the information against Brewer, the charge being solely one of "manipulating and falsifying papers and books belonging to and in the possession of the Bank of Montreal." The
