## NEW INDUSTRY AT ARKONA

Things begin to look prosperous for the village of Arkona and surrounding district. Early this spring, three enterprising citizens, Messrs. John Harnish, E. Richter and Chas. Herrington, decided to try and grow Havana tobacco, which is used for wrappers for the best grade of cigars. Five acres were set out with plants and as a result they will harvest from 3,000 to 4,000 lbs. of tobacco, which at the present market price is worth about \$1.00 a lb.

This is the first time in the history of Ontario that Havana tobacco has been successfully grown in the province, and a representative of the Imperial Tobacco Co., Montreal, who was in the village recently, is so enthusiastic about it, that he claims the Company will build a large packing house there which will employ from 50 to 100 hands, if the residents of the district will contract to grow 500 acres of this kind of tobacco next year. A public meeting will likely be called shortly and will be addressed by several representatives of the above Company. Mr. Harnish has had a large experience in the growing of tobacco and is also an expert cigar maker. He was the first man to grow Havana tobacco in Pennsylvania, where it is now grown extensively, and the seed which was grown in Arkona last spring was brought from that State. As there are only certain sections in the United States where this grade of tobacco can be grown to have the best flavor and the soil around Arkona seems to have that requirement, there is little doubt but a large and profitable new industry is bound to be well under way next year.—Forest Standard.
