YUKON SCANDALS UP AGAIN

Sir C. H. Tupper Puts His Charges in a Resolution.

He Speaks for Seven Hours, and Makes Vicious Charges Against the Officials, Mr. Ogilvie and Minister Sifton—He Asks for a Royal Commission to be Appointed With Proper Powers to Investigate Complaints.

Ottawa, June 28.—Sir Hilbert Tupper, on the motion to go into supply being moved in the House yesterday afternoon, rose and for the second time this session arranged the Government, and especially the Minister of the Interior, for the maladministration of the Yukon. He spoke for seven hours, and made vicious charges against the officials, Mr. Ogilvie and Minister Sifton—He Asks for a Royal Commission to be Appointed With Proper Powers to Investigate Complaints.

The Commission Fed. Sir Hilbert next called attention to the present Government's fondness for issuing commissions, with very full powers to investigate, on the slightest suspicion of every trifling matter. He pointed out with the reluctance with which the Government had approached an investigation of Yukon affairs, and the very limited powers given Commissioner Ogilvie, when an enquiry was tardily granted.

Mr. Ogilvie's Appointment. He severely criticized the appointment of Mr. Ogilvie to investigate the charges made by the Miners' Association and others, not only on account of his relationship by marriage with the Minister of the Interior, but also on account of the unfitness for the position from lack of experience and legal training, and declared that it was Mr. Ogilvie's adviser, Mr. Clement, and not Mr. Ogilvie himself, who really made the rulings and controlled the investigation.

He read explicitly from the report of evidence taken before Mr. Ogilvie, to show the manner in which the investigation was conducted, and said that Mr. Ogilvie and Mr. Clement seemed to think they were holding a court instead of conducting an investigation. He said that, despite the manner in which the investigation was conducted, the Minister of the Interior had shown most notorious conduct on the part of officials.

Justice McGuire's Advice. Judge McGuire had given Gold Commissioner Favre's advice on his appointment with regard to his office, and afterwards became interested in gold claims. He continued, at length, reviewing the evidence taken by Mr. Ogilvie, holding that it disclosed a very rotten state of affairs amongst other things showing that the Commissioner Favre was afraid of the very shadow of Major Walsh, who terrorized over him.

After recess, Sir Hilbert continued his criticism. Shortly after a very smart little "crap" between him and Dr. Landorin took place. Sir Hilbert was proceeding to show that in the so-called election frauds in Manitoba, the Federal Government promptly took action to have detectives sent out to ferret out evidence, when Dr. Landorin interrupted to know if that referred to an officer of the Inland Revenue Department in Winnipeg, who drew salary for nothing.

Perceiving in his interruption, after being warned by Mr. Speaker, Dr. Landorin provoked the observation of Sir Hilbert that the remarks were "mandarin."

Dr. Landorin (excitedly)—Mandarin! Mandarin, did you say? You ought to be ashamed of yourself! Sir Hilbert—I am surprised at my own moderation.

Case of Lucille Elliott. He went over the case of Lucille Elliott again, and attacked Major Walsh's arbitrary conduct in closing Dominion Creek. He reviewed at some length Nelson v. Donnelly case, known as the overlapping case, and pilloried the appeal from the Gold Commissioner to the Minister of the Interior. After continuing in the same strain until nearly 11 o'clock he read a paper containing a list of about 1500 workmen gaining elaborate fines on charges of insubordination, etc., against Major Walsh, and misconduct on the part of various officials in the Yukon, and concluding with a resolution that the Royal Commission, of two or more judges of the Supreme Court, or of the Superior Court of any of the provinces, be appointed to investigate the charges. He spoke for a few minutes in support of his motion and then moved the adjournment of the debate, which was agreed to by the Premier on the condition that the debate close today.

The following are the charges against Major Walsh, made in the resolution moved by Sir C. H. Tupper in the House today: "That Major Walsh, after the issuing of the ordinance prohibiting the sale of liquor on Sunday, permitted one Lucille Elliott to keep open on the Sabbath a store for the sale of cigars and light drinks, and the said Lucille Elliott sold spirituous liquors by virtue of this order, and in contravention of outstanding and unrevoked ordinances and regulations."

"That while acting as such chief executive officer of the Government of Canada, the Major carried on in the Yukon a liaison with one known as Lucille Elliott, who was permitted to enjoy privileges, advantages and favors from the local authorities in said district, and the said Elliott returned to work yesterday, but in other departments the workmen went out during the forenoon to enforce their demands."

Several hundred painters, who demand an increase of 25 cents an hour, joined the strikers' ranks yesterday. Another conference was held between representatives of the packing firms in regard to arranging for the shipment of the trout. Most of the packers were in favor of

grating the demands of the men. It was believed that an amicable agreement would be reached before night, and that by to-day all the strikers will have returned to work. The strikers claim that they have 1,500 men out.

OUTBREAKS AT CLEVELAND. Cleveland, Ohio, June 28.—The riotous outbreaks of Monday were repeated yesterday in several quarters of the city, non-union men on the Broadway line and those were repeatedly stoned, every window being broken, and the conductors and motormen being repeatedly struck. At Astor avenue a mob, several hundred strong, was broken up by the police. The non-union car men took to their heels, and were pursued by the crowd, but made their escape. The abandoned cars were wrecked by the mob. Similar scenes were enacted at North and Rhodes avenues, and Burton and Clark avenues. The exodus of non-union men from the city continued.

ALL BELGIAN WORKMEN WILL STRIKE. Brussels, June 28.—The committee of the Federation of Labor party held a meeting in this city last night and decided upon a general strike of Brussels workmen, as a protest against the Government's electoral bill. The strike will begin on July 15, the day when the debate on the measure opens in the Chamber of Deputies.

RECIPROCITY WITH BERNEZ. Washington, June 28.—A reciprocity treaty relating to the British West Indies colony of Bermuda has been concluded and the Bermuda commission has left for home with a draft of the treaty, which is to be submitted to the Bermuda Legislature before being finally signed on behalf of the two Governments, by Commissioner Kason and Mr. Tower, the British charge. Fair progress is being made on the Jamaican treaty, but the negotiations will not be concluded this week.

ALL HOLIDAYS THIS WEEK. Belleville, June 28.—The North Hastings election trial yesterday, before Justices Rose and Falconbridge, lasted but a few minutes. Mr. C. S. Grant, for the petitioner, said he had no evidence to offer and the case was dismissed. Mr. W. W. Easton, Conservative member, thus holds his seat.

ANOTHER BIG DEAL. Montreal, June 28.—There is some prospect of the Dominion Steel & Iron Company of Sydney purchasing the Wellington nickel mines at Sudbury. This mineral deposit, which has the reputation of being the richest nickel mine outside of New California, has not been worked for several years. The property before the death of Mr. Duncan McIntyre was valued at about \$750,000. However, it is thought that at the present time it could be purchased for considerably less.

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OTIS IS SUPPRESSING NEWS. States are Beginning to Grumble at His Rigid Press Censorship. New York, June 28.—An evening paper publishes the following from its Washington correspondent: "The press censorship at Manila is attracting a good deal of attention, not least at Washington than in other parts of the United States."

ARTILLERY SCHOOL. Major-General Hutton Says One Will Be Established at Kingston. Niagara, June 28.—Major-General Hutton carefully inspected the artillery brigade yesterday afternoon. In speaking after inspecting Major-General Hutton said that the practical drill was as good as it could be, the organization of the camp was excellent, but he hoped soon to see the theoretical part of artillery tactics greatly improved. To this end he prophesied that an instructional school for artillery would be founded in Kingston before 18 months were passed, with "I. Stone" at the head. There was no such school in Canada and one was needed badly if Canada was to do her part as a noticeable force in the Imperial field.

THE ARTILLERY FIGHT BRIGADE. The artillery fight will take place on Friday and will reach to Queen's Heights. On Thursday the men bang away at the floating booms in the lake, and on Saturday take part in the grand review.

ROQUELAIN WATERWORKS BURNED. Rouquelin, Ont., June 28.—Monday night about midnight the Waterworks Company's building was seen to be on fire. It was found impossible to stay the ravages of the flames, and the building and machinery were soon a heap of ruins. The loss to the Waterworks Company is estimated at \$6,000. \$1,500 of which was covered by insurance. In addition, about \$2,000 worth of electric plants belonging to Mr. Keefe, that was stored in the building, was destroyed. This also was insured for \$1,600.
