## THE DOMINION CATTLE, SHEEP, AND SWINE BREEDERS' ASSOCIATIONS.

Annual Membership Fees .- Cattle Breeders' \$1, Sheep Breeders', \$1, Swine Breeders', \$2, BENEFITS OF MEMBERSHIP.

Bach member receives a free copy of each publication issued by the Association to which he belongs, furing the year in which he is a member of the Swine Breeders' Association this includes a copy of the Swine Record.

A member of the Swine Bi Vers' As ciation is allowed to register pigs at 50c, per head; non-members are charged \$1.00 per head.

A member of the Sheep Breed association is allowed to register sheep at 500, per head, while non-members are charged \$1.00.

The name and address of each member, and the stock he has for sale, are published once a month. Over 10,000 copies of this directory are mailed monthly. Copies are sent to each Agricultural College and each Experiment Station in Canada and the United States, above prominent breeders and probable buyers resident a Canada, the United States and discohere.

A member of an Association will only be allowed to advertise stock corresponding to the Association to bluch he belongs; that is, to advertise cuttle he must be a member of the Dominion Cattle Breeders' Association, to advertise sheep he must be a member of the Dominion Sheep Breeders' Association, and to advertise saine he must be a member of the Dominion Swine Breeders' Association.

The list of cattle, sheep, and swine for sale will be published in the third issue of each month. Members having stock for sale, in order that they may be included in the Gazette, are required to notify the under signed by letter on or before the, oth month, of the animals.
