A Vaginal Tampon of *Antiphlogistine*

WE find that the use of Antiphlogistine in vaginal tampons is a new thought to many a physician, but when he once learns of it, he wonders that he has not used it in that way before. In fact, Antiphlogistine makes the ideal tampon, for while its hygroscopic properties deplete the congested parts, its plastic nature affords the required support.

TECHNIQUE—Place the requisite quantity of Antiphlogistine in the centre of a square of gauze, gather the edges up around the Antiphlogistine bag-fashion, tie a string around the middle of the bag and insert through a speculum.

Wherever inflammation or congestion is a factor, Antiphlogistine is indicated and should always be applied warm and thick and covered with absorbent cotton.
