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government supporters in the Senate were consulted before this course was entered into? Secondly, has he any means whereby such changes could be made or brought about constitutionally without the consent of the Senate?

Right Hon. P.-E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): In reply to the first question, Mr. Speaker, there has been consultation on the constitutional question on several occasions in caucus and caucus committees. We have discussed the future of the constitution, and all the subjects that were raised as a result of last February's federal-provincial conference.

I was not, of course, in a position to spell out in detail to caucus what propositions we were making, because they were considered confidential, but the caucus was encouraged to discuss all aspects of federal institutions, including the Senate, and the subject was discussed. There were many senators present at the time as they always come to our caucus meetings.

On the second question, Mr. Speaker, this is a legal opinion for which I am being asked, but I would say that I see no desirability of proceeding with such a reform of the Senate without ample consultation with the Senate, and without giving the Senate a chance to express its views on the subject.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear.

Mr. Diefenbaker: Mr. Speaker, in view of the discussion that took place in the Senate yesterday afternoon, led by Senator Connolly, a former leader of the Senate, and other senators, to the effect that this was the first knowledge they had of such ideas being held by the government, what has the Prime Minister to say?

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I would think the Prime Minister should say what he feels should be said in this regard on another occasion, rather than in an answer to a question at this time.
