FRANCOPHONIE CONFERENCE—OMISSION FROM AGENDA

Hon. Pat Carney (Minister for International Trade): Mr. Speaker, the Hon. Member is well aware of the efforts that have been made by the Secretary of State for External Affairs with regard to the question of human rights. He has raised it, as does the Prime Minister, in every country on every opportunity.

As the Hon. Member is well aware, the Secretary of State for External Affairs has already explained that this item is not on the agenda because it would be very divisive at this particular summit.

Some Hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Miss Carney: The issue of human rights and the discussions of human rights will underlie all agenda items.

POLITICAL RIGHTS OF FEDERAL EMPLOYEES—GOVERNMENT POSITION

During the 1984 election campaign the Conservative Party promised, and I quote: A general abolition concerning the political activities of federal employees, particularly those who are protected by a collective agreement.

ARRIVAL OF HONDURANS AT VANCOUVER INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT
