MEMBERSHIP OF STANDING COMMITTEE ON ABORIGINAL AFFAIRS AND NORTHERN DEVELOPMENT

Mr. Keith Penner (Cochrane—Superior): Mr. Speaker, when this House recently agreed to a package of parliamentary reforms it was, in part, to give standing committees more freedom and independence from the Government. That being so, you will understand my astonishment when late last week the Chief Government Whip showed up at the organization meeting of the Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development to impose upon it, as Chairman, a new MP who has never before served on this committee. The ranking Conservative member, a man of experience and empathy with Canada's indigenous peoples, was passed over. What goes on? Simply, Sir, the Government has decided to cool down native issues, to dampen expectations raised by the previous Minister responsible.

In my nearly two decades as a Member of this House I have never felt quite so discouraged and despondent about the possibility of progress being made toward the recognition and implementation of aboriginal rights in Canada.

DISARMAMENT

CALL FOR AGREEMENT BETWEEN SUPERPOWERS

Hon. Warren Allmand (Notre-Dame-de-Grâce—Lachine East): Mr. Speaker, last Friday in New York the Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney) told the President of the United States that he was right in not abandoning star wars for an arms control agreement. This is typical of the Prime Minister's double-talk on this issue. Several months ago he said his Government was opposed to star wars but now he says it is all right for the United States to continue.

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This is Disarmament Week. There are now approximately 50,000 nuclear weapons in the world, 30,000 with the United States and NATO and 20,000 with the Soviet Union and the Warsaw Pact, which are one million times more powerful than the bombs which fell on Hiroshima, and represent 4 tonnes of TNT for every person in the world. Will the Prime Minister use the occasion of Disarmament Week to reconsider his position on nuclear disarmament and star wars and press for a superpower agreement to control and reduce all nuclear weapons, including star wars?
