The Settlement of this Province will be attended with some Charge to the Government, and on that Account may probably meet with Interruption; yet as the general Advantages are fo confpicuous, nothing should be permitted to defeat it; for altho' the Expence may at first be considerable, it will not be durable, as the new Inhabitants, by a well regulated Miliaid may be able in a few Years to defend themselves; this was the Case with the Colonies in New-England from their Infancy, altho' they struggled under Difficulties infinitely exceeding any that the proposed Settlements can be subject to, whilst Great-Britain commands at Sea: The French Inhabitants must continue to be neutral, as they flile themselves now, and the Indians are become to inconfiderable that very little Danger is to be apprehended from them, if the Settlements are made compact, and in a defenfible Form; the Maintenance of Forts, and Garri ons will then be a temporary Charge only, and foon cease to be necessary; but if it should not, the Introduction of Protestants, and
