

> **ASQUITH PASSED THRU CRISIS** IN DIVISION ON FINANCE BILL

LONDON, Wednesday, July 8 .- What is admitted by government supporters to be a crisis, developed in the commons yesterday, when the premier's motion allotting time for the remaining stages of the ce bill carried by the reduced majority of 23 votes. There were 20 Liberal abstentions on the main division, but subsequently the

government's majority rose to 124. In the house of lords the government suffered defeat on the India Council bill. On motion of Lord Curzon, former viceroy, it was rejected by 96 votes to 38.






