

The report of the disbursements in the month of November' showed a great drain on the resources of the institution. About three thousand families are being taken care of now, which is far above the number in any year before. There are still three and a half months to run and they are winter months. Last year only 2820 families were attended all together. The largest number before that was 2400. There are two hundred and thirty permanent in-mates now in the House of Industry. In November 20,783 meals were served to men, 161 to women or a total of 20,944 meals. This shows an average of about 698 meals.


