Havana Charges Against Joe Knight and Jockey Wolfe Are Sustained.

Knight and Jockey Wolfe were ruled off the Cuban race track for alleged fraud. Jockey Wolfe was implicated in the transaction, and at the investigation which followed he and Knight were ruled off the Havana track. Wolfe is the lad who was discharged by R. T. Wilson, president of the Saržatoga Racing Association, for several ansatisfactory rides on his race horses iast season.

This rule was made in order to stop men from acting as agents for several jockeys and employers at one time Last year one man worked for about six riders and turfmen, and caused endiess confusion and trouble by making mistakes as to declarations and riding engagements for the jockeys.
