The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency be made at any agency, on certain conter, brother or sister of intending home-steader. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the lad in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, sen, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-upt a quarter-lection alongside his namestead.
