MR. LENNOX UNDER FIRE  
STUCK FIRMLY TO GUNS

Architect Denied His Evidence  
Gleashed With Previous Testi-  
mony—Battle Over "Extras."

"I am giving the straight facts, the best I can without any intention to screen or exaggerate," declared Architect E. J. Lennox yesterday before Judge Latchford, when H. L. Drayton, K.C., counsel for the corporation, attempted to shake his evidence by a severe cross examination.

The heaviest attack was made on the claim of \$21,000 for adjusting extras of the many city hall contracts, and Mr. Drayton strove to show that this was part of the architect's duty under his contract with the city, and that it was the usual duty of an architect.

Mr. Lennox denied that his contract was not a usual one, but a special one. He admitted that the point had not been brought up by him until 1911. "Didn't you know it was necessary for council to pass upon the recom- mendations of the building commis- sion?" asked Mr. Drayton, going into the matter of the authority under which Mr. Lennox acted.

"No, not for some time," replied the witness. "Not until Mr. Biegar told me that I should have a written con- tract with the council. I thought the building committee was supreme in these things."

"What? I understand that you were a 'king-maker' and a destroyer of kings?" "Which particular 'king' did Mr. Lennox make?" asked Mr. Cowan. "I never knew I had that honor," de- clared Mr. Lennox.

"Do you want to swear, after all you have told us during the past few days, that you were not aware of the civic machinery?" asked Counsel Dray- ton. "I did learn, to my cost, that there was civic machinery," replied the wit- ness.

His Fees Were Cut.  
Mr. Lennox stated that when it was decided to build a larger building, he received a verbal agreement that he was to receive 15 per cent. for archi- tect's fees instead of the 4 per cent. he claimed on the \$400,000 plans. This, he said, was the custom in council, when the report went up.

"Did you protest?" he was asked. "Yes." "When you produced the protest?" "No. It is down in my claim." "Yes. You put it down in your claim when these men are dead and buried?"

"Then the minutes will show it?" "There is very little in the minutes about it. The minutes were very badly kept." "Do you mean to insinuate that in 1887 there was any reason for withhold- ing the truth?"

"Yet in April of that year you stood up in council and made a protest against your fee being reduced, and there is nothing about it in the minutes." "The council was unanimous against the reduction," Mr. Lennox declared.

STILL KNOCKING CENSUS

Montreal Claims 25,000 More Than It Is Credited With.

MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—Judging from the inquiries received and the complaints made at the assessment depart- ment, the present Dominion census of the City of Montreal is about 25,000 short of its actual population, at a conservative estimate. This statement was made to-day by P. W. Collins of the municipal assessment department, in discussing the returns from Ottawa.

Mr. Collins also said that the best method of taking census in cities was thru the assessors. The assessment de- partment had a complete list of the houses in town, and the assessors would prepare cards for each house for filling out. This was a scientific plan, and omissions could be readily detected.

"If the census enumerators had even come to us after they took the returns we could have checked the figures and told them of omissions."

Mr. William Bobb, the city treasurer, said that the assessment commissioners were going to recommend to the board of control that they should be instructed to take an annual census of the city.

Dr. Louis Laberge, medical health officer, said that according to his esti- mate, the enumerators were at least 4,000 short in their count.

C. P. R. Improvements.  
MONTREAL, Oct. 12.—The Canadian Pacific Railway announce that they will spend over five million dollars in hotel extension and rebuilding. Prac- tically the whole system from the At- lantic to the Pacific Ocean is having extensive extensions and alterations made and the improvements include the splendid hotel now being erected at Calgary.

Served for Thirty-Eight Years.  
KINGSTON, Oct. 12.—(Special.)—On the resignation of G. M. Macdonnell as their solicitor, the trustees of Queen's appointed Frank King in his place. Mr. Macdonnell also resigned from the board after service of thirty- eight years. Dean Dupuis, Judge Mc- Tavish of Ottawa and J. Macdonald Mowat of Kingston, were appointed members of the board.

Port Mann's Future.  
It is announced that the site of Port Mann, the C.N.R. terminal on the Pacific coast, will be shortly on the market. The handling of both railway and steamship traffic at the port has been planned by the com- pany, and when its eastern and west- ern lines are linked together, it is ex- pected that Port Mann will be one of the finest terminals on the continent.

Farmers' Bank Sues Lloyds.  
Two writs, of \$25,000 each, have been issued by the Farmers' Bank of Can- ada against 42 defendants in London, England, members of Lloyds.

These amounts are in connection with the losses incurred by the bank thru W. R. Travers, the former gen- eral manager, and are over and above any amount recoverable from the U. S. Fidelity and Guaranty Co.

A Likely Candidate.  
KINGSTON, Oct. 12.—(Special.)—J. E. Freeman, a prominent farmer of Frontenac County, is spoken of as a likely candidate for the Ontario house. The county Conservatives will meet on Saturday afternoon.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homestead in- terest standing may pre-empt a quar- ter-section alongside his homestead.

During six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years, a homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts he has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for one or more homesteads in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre.
