00 Prisoners Mutiny in Spanish

Eight hundred convicts confined in the Central Prison at Tarragona, Spain, made a daring attempt to overpower the warders and escape.

By prearrangement they began an upcoar while the warders were changing guard, and then rushed into the central courtyard armed with knives and iron rods wrenched from the windows of the wrenched from the windows of the

The convicts swarmed around the gate, brandishing their weapons and threatening to kill all the warders unless they handed over their keys. The noise could be heard thruout the town, and thousands of people assembled around the prison.

When the governor arrived with another detachment of warders he was greeted with execrations and threats. A number of convicts rushed forward to attack the party and the governor arrived.
