**UNCLE SAM'S DIKE RECORDS**

Mott's Bulletin Shows That Michael  
 Holds the Biggest Bunch.

**Little Welshman Did the Competition**  
**Mile in 1.49, and Goes on to**  
**12 Miles, When Linton Takes**  
**It Up, Followed by Elkes, Wall-**  
**er, Etc.**  
 Baltimore, Dec. 13.—Chairman Mott of  
 the U.S.A. Racing Board to-day issued a  
 bulletin, showing all the professional re-  
 cords accepted by the Racing Board up to  
 the present time. The competition, stand-  
 ing start, professional record for one-third  
 mile is held by F. T. Scherfeld, who did the  
 distance in 45 seconds. Fred Sims holds  
 the half mile, with 63 3-5 seconds; G. H.  
 Coulter the two-thirds, with 1:21 1-5, while  
 Jimmy Michael did the mile in 1:49, and  
 holds the records for everything from that  
 up to 12 miles, when Tom Linton takes it  
 up, his best time being that up to  
 24 miles, which he did in 4:08 4-5. The  
 25-mile record is held by H. D. Elkes at  
 1:22 4-5; the 30-mile by Frank Walker, with  
 2:11:00 3-5, and the 35-mile by T. A. Bann-  
 aby, who made it in 4:33:32. The record  
 for the 40-mile is held by Michael, with  
 1:55 4-5, made by W. W. Hamilton, who  
 also holds all records in this class from  
 25 to 35 miles. Fred Sims holds the  
 three, four and five-mile records, the lat-  
 ter being made in 1:10 1-5. John  
 Leavens holds the 60-mile record, with  
 2:16:08, and Charles W. Miller has his  
 70-mile record, with 3:00:00. In the 80-mile  
 class, with paces, Major Taylor holds the  
 one-mile, with 1:31 4-5, and everything  
 up to 10 miles, with 1:00:00. Fred Sims  
 up, having done the distance in 1:33 1-5.  
 He also holds all records up to 25 miles.  
 The latter is held by James McMichael,  
 who did it in 4:08 2-5. Harry Elkes holds all re-  
 cords in this class up to 35 miles, and  
 Frank Walker from that up to 35 miles, and  
 the latter in 4:32:34.  
 The time records are as follows: One  
 hour, flying start, paced, 34 miles, 1:23  
 1-5; H. D. Elkes; standing start,  
 31 miles, 1:23 1-5; James McMichael,  
 flying start, unpaced, 25 miles, 600 yards,
