

MUTINEERS ADE ROBBILLIARD'S PRESS RELEASES SEBASTIAN POL

Kniaz Potemkin, Using Full Charges, Opens Fire on City—State of Martial Law Proclaimed, and 10,000 Troops Are in City—Hundred Reported Killed in Early Morning Rioting—Incendiaries Destroy Property Along Docks and Threaten to Burn All Public Buildings.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 29.—(Special.)—THE EMPEROR HAS ISSUED THE FOLLOWING URGENT MESSAGE TO THE RUSSIAN SENATE: "IN ORDER TO GUARANTEE PUBLIC SAFETY AND TO TERMINATE THE DISORDERS AT ODESSA AND NEIGHBORING LOCALITIES WE HAVE FOUND IT NECESSARY TO DECLARE A STATE OF WAR IN ODESSA AND DISTRICT, AND TO INVEST THE COMMANDER OF THE TROOPS IN THE MILITARY DISTRICT OF ODESSA WITH THE RIGHTS OF MILITARY AUTHORITY AND SPECIAL RIGHTS OF CIVIL ADMINISTRATION FOR THE DEFENSE OF ORDER AND PUBLIC TRANQUILITY."

FIRING ON TOWN. London, June 30.—(Special.)—The Odessa correspondent of the Daily Telegraph in a despatch filed at 11.20 o'clock Thursday night says that the Kniaz Potemkin is firing on the town, and that Admiral Kruger's squadron is not in sight.

FLEET JUST STARTED. St. Petersburg, June 30.—(3.45 a.m.)—A despatch which arrived here early this morning from the port announced that a squadron of battleships, the Tri Sviatitsa, Sinope and Rebatzky, with a cruiser and several torpedo boats, only started for Odessa at 8 o'clock last evening.

Odessa, June 29.—(Evening.)—A semblance of order has been restored here, but the situation is still critical. The central railway station was destroyed by fire tonight, many people being injured. The funeral of Omilchuk, which has just been held, became an imposing demonstration, but without disorder. A great procession, headed by priests, followed the body to military cemetery. The coffin, covered with St. Andrew's flag, and with numerous wreaths, was carried by eight hundred men.

London, June 29.—(Special.)—The Daily Express reports that the Russian fleet has just started for Odessa. A second mutiny is reported at the Port of Spain, where a transport with Russians from Port Arthur and Kniaz Potemkin were held up by a mutiny to lie up under her guns for two hours.
