ing after his client. He then read the alleged libel which he characterized as a slanderous article and wanted to know how on earth articles printed in different papers throughout the country were relevant to the small part of the editorial which appeared in the Gleaner, the charge being that Mr. Crockett caused it to be published and that it was libelous.

Reason for Evidence.

Mr. Hazen felt that it was bad taste and bad judgment for the leader of the bar of the Province to get up in the court and make a political speech such as he had made. Mr. Hazen withstanding said that his desire was to use the evidence he was asking to introduce to show concerning the credibility of the witness, Mr. Emmerson had admitted that he was in a hotel in Montreal with women. By means of the cartoon, besides showing the credibility of the witness it was also proposed to show that public discussion on the matter had taken place.

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., for the defense, also pressed for the admission of the evidence, stating that Mr. Emmerson had said that he had no idea upon earth who the parliamentary charges referred to, and in this connection it was decided to take up the credibility of the witness. If Mr. Emmerson had seen the Toronto World's cartoon they could argue on that point.

The Question in Dispute.

The following question was then put by Mr. Hazen: "I ask you, Mr. Emmerson, was your attention drawn to a cartoon in the Toronto World of March 1, entitled, 'In the Stocks,' and do you know who the ministers of the crown there represented?"

The magistrate ruled out the question.

The report in the St. John Sun of Mr. Emmerson's speech at Moncton, where he was reported to have said that he left St. Lawrence Hall with ladies was read, and Mr. Emmerson said it was a correct report.

"Most unqualifiedly," said Mr. Emmerson, when he said he did not know he was meant, when Mr. Bourassa made the statement of a minister being at a hotel with women, it was a matter of fact. I could not conjecture who was referred to, and I never associated the fact of my having been there with the ladies referred to.

"I never knew or heard of the talk about Ottawa or Montreal," continued Mr. Emmerson, "and I was accused of such things, and if I had I would have been." The balance of this sentence could not be heard.

Mr. Hazen then quoted further from the speech of Mr. Bourassa regarding the property of the crown being used for certain purposes and Mr. Emmerson told of hearing the speech.

Returned As His Guest.

Continuing, Mr. Emmerson said that he left the Albion Hotel in Montreal early on the morning following the night he had gone there with Mrs. Allen and Mrs. Beauthner, and that he did not see them before leaving the hotel. When Mrs. Beauthner traveled from Quebec to Montreal in his car, she did so as his guest, Mr. Emmerson said, and had no pass or ticket. Mrs. Allen, he said, was a daughter of a man who had for 40 years been confidential clerk to the witness' father.

The Re-examination.

On being re-examined by Mr. Pugsley, Mr. Emmerson said that so far as he knew Mrs. Allen was a woman of unimpaired character, and so far as he knew Mrs. Beauthner was also a woman of good character. Regarding going to the Albion Hotel, Mr. Emmerson said that he did not think that the register clerk was in the hotel office when they entered. Nothing of the kind happened between him and the woman. He sent the women down to pay his bill as a matter of convenience, and left St. Lawrence Hall as a matter of gallantry, but perhaps it had not been the right thing for him to do.

The connection which Mr. Peters had with the Record Foundry was explained by Mr. Emmerson, who said that he had made the trip to Montreal to see him, and that Mr. Peters lived at the St. Lawrence Hall, but was out of town.

Mr. Emmerson said that he had never been ejected from any place alone or with women. When leaving Montreal, Mr. Emmerson said that Mrs. Allen and Mrs. Beauthner went to the station and asked for a pass for Mrs. Beauthner to use in transportation back to Quebec, but he could not give it there, as he had none with him.

Prosecution Case Finished.

Mr. Emmerson was allowed to leave the stand, and it was announced that the case for the prosecution was finished.

Ex-Minister Recalled.

A few moments later Mr. Emmerson was recalled, and went on the stand once more, and Mr. Pugsley read to him a portion of the speech of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the famous "wine, women, and graft" debate, saying there would be an investigation if anybody would lay formal charges. Mr. Emmerson said that Hansard had a fair report. This completed the case for the prosecution.

Col. Marsh then called upon Mr. Crockett to stand up. The counsel had a brief conference, and Mr. Crockett dispensed with the reading of the depositions.

Says It Is True.

His honor then asked Mr. Crockett if he had anything to say, using the usual form in which it said that he had nothing to fear from any threat, and nothing to hope from any promise or favor, etc.

Mr. Hazen, speaking for Mr. Crockett, said that Mr. Crockett admitted writing and having published it on the 7th of March. He said that he was further instructed to say that the statements were true; that at the time that he wrote them Mr. Crockett had the reasonable grounds for believing them to be true; that they were relevant to the public interests; that they were published in the public interests; and that they had been the subject for discussion in New Brunswick and out-

side of New Brunswick previous to the time that they were published.

The defense then opened their case, it being then 12:30 o'clock. George M. Smith, of Montreal, accountant for the estate of Henry Hagan, was the first witness called for the defense. The late Mr. Hagan died in 1902, and the estate owned the St. Lawrence until May 1 last. He had had control of the books of the hotel until May 1. Mayor McLeod, who was conducting the examination of witness produced the hotel register of the St. Lawrence Hall including the pages for June last. Mr. McLeod asked to have the register admitted as evidence.

Admits the Register.

The counsel at this stage of proceedings engaged in a wordy war lasting for some time, Mr. McLeod accusing Mr. Pugsley of trying to browbeat him and trying to run the whole court. Mr. Pugsley claimed that Mr. McLeod was acting in an extraordinary manner. Mr. Pugsley addressed Mr. Pugsley as the "learned doctor." Col. Marsh decided to admit as evidence the portion of register with the names of Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, Mrs. George C. Allen of Moncton, and Mrs. A. Beauthner, of Quebec.

At a few minutes after one o'clock the court adjourned until 2:30 this afternoon.

The city council chamber, which is being used as a court room, was completely filled with spectators all morning, those present including many from outside of the city, and the greatest of interest was shown in the various questions which came up.

Afternoon Evidence.

The defense this afternoon called Mr. John Lloyd, night clerk at the St. Lawrence Hotel, Montreal. Mr. H. F. McLeod took charge of the examination.

The witness testified that he was a resident of Montreal when he was night clerk at the hotel, and had been for 36 years. On the night of June 8, two ladies registered at the hotel as M. Morter and M. Boutellier. On June 10 H. R. Emmerson, registered at the hotel. There are two parts to the hotel, the old and new part, joined by a bridge, under which is the office. He went on duty that night at 11 o'clock. There was a noise during the night. On that night about 12 o'clock he was smoking in the office. About that time the watchman was going round.

Mr. Pugsley here objected to Mr. Lloyd's evidence. McLeod contended that the evidence was admissible, as Mr. Lloyd was in charge of the hotel, and knew everything that was going on.

Mr. Lloyd, continuing, stated to Mr. McLeod that he was the night porter. Mr. Lloyd swore that a complaint had been made by one of the porters, a Mr. Chapman, that a gentleman in an adjoining room made a complaint to him that a noise was being made, as a result of which he could not rest.

Pugsley Objects.

Mr. Pugsley objected to Mr. Lloyd's testimony that complaints were made to the witness that night. Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., contended that the evidence was clearly admissible by all the rules of evidence, and cited cases where his honor had before ruled in accordance with the present contention. Mr. McLeod complained that it was a waste to shut out the testimony. Mr. Lloyd said that he had given the porter some orders. When Mr. McLeod asked what the instructions were the attorney-general and some others of the prosecution's counsel jumped to their feet and objected. Col. Marsh ruled the question out.

"I am surprised that the attorney-general has so far forgotten himself as to come to the city and ask you to fall in line with such extraordinary ruling," said Mr. Crockett.

Warm Passages.

Mr. Pugsley said that he would not consider Mr. Crockett's impertinent observation. Mr. Crockett remarked that the attorney-general came here and tried to run the court. The question and the report were ruled out. Then the examination of Mr. Lloyd continued. He said that the tall one of the women appeared not properly clad for the street. She asked for her bill. He gave it to her, and she asked for his (Emmerson's) bill, too, which he gave to her. She was talking rapidly to herself, and appeared

GUATEMALA'S CONSPIRACY

Cabrera Orders Trial To Be Held in Open Court.

Guatemala City, May 30.—Public trial of the seventeen persons convicted and sentenced to death for alleged complicity in the plot to assassinate President Cabrera, began here yesterday afternoon before the military court of appeal.

The hearing will probably take three days, as all of the testimony taken during the first secret trial is being read in public.

Soldiers and officers of Cabrera's army crowd the court room, which is very small, and few civilians are able to get in. All of the foreign ministers are present, except Philip Brown, the charge d'affaires of the United States legation.

The proposed note of the diplomatic corps to the Government, protesting against the first trial in these cases, has not been delivered, according to Mr. Brown, and probably will not be, as the Cabrera Government has shown that it

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
