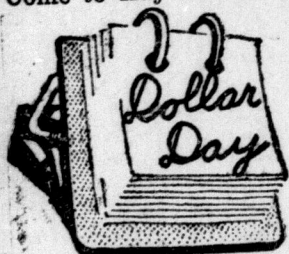

OFFICERS ELECTED FOR AID COMMISSION AT ANNUAL MEETING

Although he declared that he would like to see someone else take his office, John M. Moore was re-elected unanimously as chairman of the Soldiers' Aid Commission at a meeting of that body on Tuesday afternoon. Other officers chosen were: Lieut.-Col. A. A. Campbell, vice-chairman; W. W. Gamble, treasurer; F. G. Jewell, C.M., manager; G. F. Copeland, chairman of the finance committee; A. W. White, chairman of the employment committee; F. E. Harley, chairman of the reception committee; W. E. Greaves, Middlesex County representative; Ed H. Lance, secretary.

Joseph Warwick of Toronto, provincial secretary of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, declared that officials of the organization expected that it would be in existence for at least twenty years, as it was pledged to support the one-year-old children of soldiers. Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles was of the opinion that the commission was to exist for that length of time that it should be reorganized.

It was said also by members of the commission that the S. A. C. should let the Government employment bureau turned soldiers, and that the S. A. C. should keep out of this business as much as possible, so that there would be no overlapping.

Secretary Warwick stated that in his experience about 87 per cent of the men who applied for work were given jobs.

A party of 90 soldiers of all ranks off the S.S. Caronia for this district arrived in this city last night, detraining at the Quebec street station of the C. P. R.

Following detraining the troops proceeded from the station directly to Carling Heights, where they were mobilized. TELEGRAPHERS GET \$10 A MONTH MORE BY BOARD'S AWARD

MONTREAL, Aug. 19.—The Canadian Railway Board of Adjustment made the following award today concerning the C. P. R. Company's telegraphers and its employees members of the Commercial Telegraphers Union of America.

The judgment handed down gives an increase of \$10 a month to Morse operators at what is termed “outside points,” and \$12 a month to the three percentage groups in the percentage offices.

Included in the latter are Montreal, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Moose Jaw, Calgary and Vancouver. The wages in these three percentage groups will now be \$122.25, \$129.60 and \$132 with a minimum of \$111 over the entire system.

An eight-hour day will be worked on all outside large centre offices. Previously a nine-hour day was worked. The minimum wage will be \$30 a month and \$35 after one year's service.

The increase is to date back to June 1, and in future the clerks are to be included in the wage schedule. But the present arrangement of the amount of the wages of clerks was not decided. The wages were referred back to the board for its sitting on September 15.
