the nationalization of their industry. The resolution pledges insistence by the body that the Government adopt the majority report of the coal commission, presented last June, known as the Sankey report.

This report provides for the state control of their operation, in which the miners would have an effective voice. The resolution passed today calling for acceptance of the report by the Government adds:
