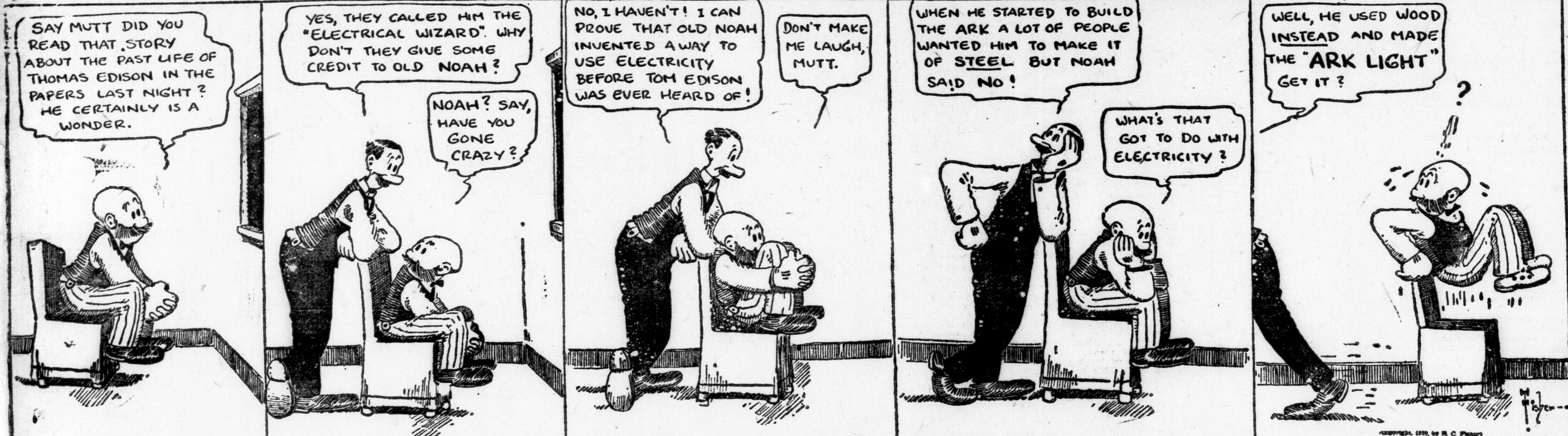

To Be Fast.

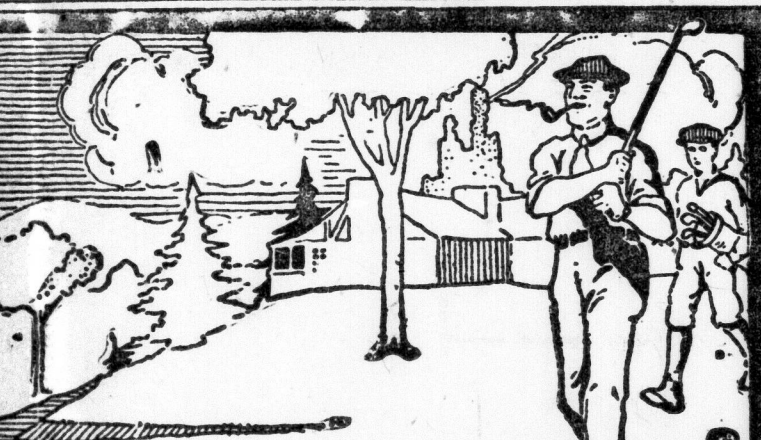

LARGE FIELD TAKES PART
IN PINEHURST TOURNAMENT

PINEHURST, March 2.—A field of 32 took part in the final session of the spring tournament, qualifying round at Pinehurst today, and 18 sixteen quailed for match play. Sam Graham of Greenwich, won the qualifying medal with a total of 77-115 for the 36 holes, and a walk followed at the 38th hole. Merriam of Waterbury, W. E. Truesdell, the Garden City veteran, and third place at 162. George Murphy of Wollaston had a 73 today, and finished at 163, but fell a victim to technicality. He was disqualified under a decision of the rules of the golf commission, prohibiting a practice shot in stroke competition.

LESS RESTRICTIONS ON
BOXING BOUTS IN N. Y.

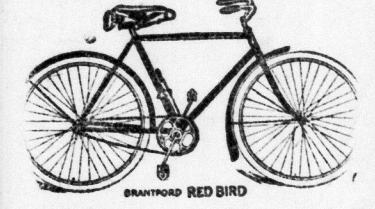
Albany, N.Y., March 3.—Final amendments to the Walker bill legalizing boxing exhibitions in New York State will be made today as a result of a conference the Democratic leader, Senator James J. Walker, had yesterday with the Republican leader of the Senate, J. Henry Walters, and Senator Alvah W. Burlingame, Jun., chairman of the Senate Judiciary committee, which is handling the measure.

While the bill in its completed form will permit fifteen-round bouts, it will give the boxing commission power to have shorter bouts. Boxing matches will be permitted on Sundays, and five-ounce gloves will be required for the boxers up to the lightweight division. Six-ounce gloves for the heavier men.
