

INSTRUCT STUDENTS IN USE OF LIBRARY

Western University Plans To
Save Pupils Time and
Trouble.

The general library of the Western University placed over 1,850 books, fully catalogued, on its shelves yesterday morning, according to the report of the librarian to the general committee Tuesday afternoon. Included in these were nearly 900 volumes from the Barnett collection dealing with Shakespeare, and there remain several hundred volumes of Shakespearean still to be dealt with. The figures give some idea of the university library's resources on the works of England's great dramatist.

Dr. H. M. Hill, director of the Institute of Public Health, has been added to the committee, and took his seat yesterday for the first time. The library of the Institute of Public Health was fully catalogued some time ago by the university staff, and it is the intention of Dr. Hill to have his library resource available for the university generally.

It was decided that purchases of certain books should be made at once for a new course in public health nursing, which has been started in the field of sociology. The decision was also reached to make some extra purchases this year for the department of biology.

Beginning with the fall term every student entering Western University will receive two hours a week instruction in the use of the library. It is believed that with this instruction at the beginning of their university career, students will save their time and get more out of their use of the library than if merely left to themselves. The instruction will be in charge of Miss Margaret Ross, the university librarian, with help from her assistants as may be needed.

CITIZENS CLUB HOUSES IMPERILED

City Engineer Has Problem
To Solve On Thompson

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PLAINTIFF AWARDED \$2,825 DAMAGES IN M'GILLIVRAY CASE

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When the fall assizes opened this afternoon the jury in the case of Dauncey vs. Hodgins, et al, brought in a verdict of \$2,825 damages for plaintiff. The jury found that defendants had an incompetent engineer and had showed negligence in using a bunt pole instead of a cable.

"I wish you gentlemen would have the kindness not to fault me," said Mr. Justice Logie, presiding at the fall assizes here Tuesday afternoon, Mr. McGillivray, et al, vs. Dauncey, et al, a civil action brought by the plaintiff against the defendants, which began Monday afternoon. The action is that of Tassel Dauncey, a McGillivray farmer, for \$3,000 damages, against the defendants, John Park, Caleb Ryan, Walter Hodgins, Percy Dauncey, Wellington Sadler and Alfred Hodgins. Plaintiff claims that defendants, as owners of a threshing outfit, brought the same on his lands and negligently handled the outfit so that the fire escaped therefrom, destroying buildings on his property to the value of \$2,800. Defendants, through J. M. McEvoy, deny the allegations and dispute the claim.

The hearing of evidence in the suit was concluded Tuesday afternoon, and the counsel addressed the jury. This morning when court resumed, Justice Logie in his charge to the jurors outlined the evidence and warned them to be careful if they decided to assess damages, which he said was a difficult task, took exception to a portion of the judge's address, and his objections were in record in case of appeal being registered.

Drummond, general superintendent of the Sawyer-Massey farm implement manufacturing plant, was called by the defence Tuesday afternoon. He swore that 75 per cent of the output of his firm's threshing machines since 1914 was equipped with the model track used by the machine in the case, and that it was a modern type, and very effective in preventing sparks from escaping.

Contradicts Dauncey.
Harold Crossley, engineer on the threshing outfit of the day of the fire, swore in contradiction to Percy Dauncey that the spark blew out of the bunt pole, and then he was ordered to back the engine away from the barn property to hauling the stack blow out to the barn by cable. He was engaged in doing this when someone shouted "fire." He swore that he saw the stack destroyed. Cross-examined by plaintiff's counsel, he admitted that he had seen the stack destroyed, but that he was not sure of the cause of the fire. He was inexperienced.

He declared that the spark arrester was in good condition, having been repaired a short time previously, because the old one had been blown off coming over the road. When a new one was put on, he said, it was not fitted at once, he informed the jury that his employer, who was a farmer, had a stack of hay in the barn, and that he was not sure of the cause of the fire. 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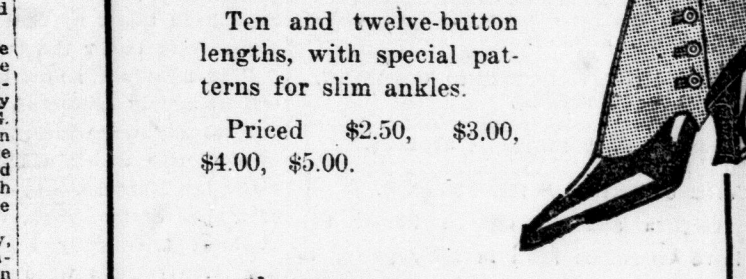
