The hockey situation in London has forced a good many fans to realize that something is wrong with the city as a sport centre, and that somethin very radical will have to be done if it is to take its proper place on the ath-

London will go to see professional baseball; that's proved and admitted even when there's a losing team. But anything approaching real athletics and amateur sport, and Londoners veer off with one accord. Hockey probably comes next in favor with Londoners even against the inadequate rink accommodation the teams have had to contend with for years. But his year, even if the fans are not tired of hockey and are willing to support it, the men behind are tired of trying to force the game over all sorts of obstacles which are not altogether concerned with rink accommodation.

Rugby and soccer keep up appearances only-and bills-but lacross, baseketball and track athletics fail to make any impression. In a city this size, there should be room for every sport and support into the bargain, but there isn't and there never will be until athletics are put under a centralized control. There may be lots to be said against the plan, and it hasn't worked out at its best in many places, but it looks like the only solution.

The victory of the Esperanto, eventhough it chalked up another boast for the Yanks, will be remembered as the inaugural win of one of the finest sporting events arranged in years.
