

QUEEN MOTHER OLGA PROCLAIMS GENERAL AMNESTY IN GREECE

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BRITISH LABOR FAVORS ADMITTING FORMER ENEMIES TO LEAGUE

FIVE HUNDRED JEWS WILL NOT VOTE AT MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS IF THEY LIVE UP TO RELIGION

Jews Who Strictly Observe the Rules of Their Faith Will Not Go to the Polls, Says Rabbi Isaac Philips.

Because the next municipal election will be held on a Saturday, hundreds of Jewish voters will be disenfranchised, unless they break one of the rules of their faith. Orthodox Jews are required to "keep holy" the seventh day. They must not transact business or indulge in any other than religious occupations.

This rule also applies to taking part in municipal affairs. Rabbi Isaac Philips of the local synagogue, told The Advertiser, Jews who strictly observe the rules of their faith will not go to the polls.

Efforts may be made to permit Jewish voters to cast their ballots at an earlier date, a privilege which is now extended to railwaymen and travelers, who expect to be out of the city on the date of the election, Rabbi Philips said.

SPLENDID RECEPTIONS ACCORDED TO HON. W. LYON MACKENZIE KING

Liberal Leader Deeply Touched at Genuine and Enthusiastic Welcome of Western Ontario People—Liberal Party Is Very Much Alive.

"I have been more than delighted, I have been deeply touched by the splendid reception which I received in London and Aylmer yesterday," said Hon. W. Lyon Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition in the Dominion House of Commons, in an interview with The Advertiser today.

The undoubted spontaneity and genuineness of these welcomes have made a great impression on the leader of the west. I only wish that my plans would have permitted me to respond to the invitations that I have received to spend a few days in your midst.

"The splendid receptions which were accorded me throughout the west were indicative of one very definite fact, namely, that the claim of certain people that the Liberal party is dead is absolutely without basis. The Liberal party is not dead, it is very much alive, and the great principles represented by it are still as virile as when first promulgated. That the same condition obtains here was conclusively proved to me yesterday.

"It is true, as many students of economic and social conditions aver, that

there is an unrest, as of a man rousing from his sleep, throughout the country. But it is not an unrest tending to subversion of the constitution or of law and order. It is an unrest indicative of the awakening of the common people to a realization that the present government is subverting the powers of parliament to the interests of the few, instead of using them for the common weal.

"The unrest is an indication of a very definite desire of the people of Canada for a change of government and a return from the present autocratic methods of government by commissions and orders-in-council to government by elected representatives. That the present government in any sense complies with the latter principle cannot be claimed even by the most hidebound supporter of the Liberal-Conservative party. Mr. King, who during his brief visit to Western Ontario, was the guest of Mayor E. S. and Mrs. Little, left London for Ottawa on the G. T. R. at 11:30 p.m.

Women Fined For Wearing Their Hats

Chicago Judge Declares, With Equal Rights, They Must Do As Men Do.

Chicago, Nov. 19.—Equal suffrage for women means that they must wear their hats when in his court room, Justice of the Peace E. F. Aring declared when he fined two women \$5 each for contempt of court when they refused to remove their hats. The women paid.

When the justice called the court to order he said: "Everybody will please remove their hats. The women paid."

Mrs. Oscar McCann and Mrs. Frederick Ritter failed to do so. The court hesitated a moment, but the two continued to wear their hats to the contempt of court, said the justice. "If women can have equal suffrage with men they can also remove their hats in my court room."

ENGLISH RUBBER MARKET GLUTTED, BUT STILL U. S. TIRES ARE BEING IMPORTED

Washington, Nov. 19.—Sharp protests have been heard in the British House of Commons against the continued importation of large quantities of United States manufactured automobile tires to Great Britain in the face of virtual stagnation in the English rubber industry, according to a dispatch to the department of commerce.

A member demanded of the board of trade information as to what action had been taken in the matter, adding that thousands of British rubber workers had been discharged, and were now swelling the ranks of the unemployed, although 30,000 tires were imported from the United States during September alone.

The situation if continued would destroy the British tire industry, it was declared. The board of trade's reply was that the whole of the question was being investigated, the dispatches said.

ROLLO FAVORS PENSIONS FOR ALL PERSONS OF 65 YEARS

Ontario Minister Points Out Difficulties of Securing Employment.

FOR AGED INDIVIDUALS

Labor Group in Legislature to Bring on Discussion.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—Hon. Walter Rollo, minister of labor, believes that there is need of old age pensions in Ontario for people of 65 years of age and upwards. In the course of an interview this morning, the minister pointed out that people of 65 years and upward have great difficulty securing employment.

The need for pensions, in his opinion, was not as great in Ontario as it was in Great Britain, but the necessity, he believes, does exist in this province. The minister of labor expects that the Labor group will discuss the question of old age pensions' legislation in the near future.

F. N. Stapleford, general secretary of the Neighborhood Workers' Association, strongly supports Hon. Mr. Rollo in his contention.

EARTH SLIDE CAUSES EXTENSIVE DAMAGE TO RAILWAY YARDS

Loss to Pennsylvania Railroad in Pittsburg May Reach Millions.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 19.—Damage estimated by engineers to vary from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 will result from the great earth slide which occurred on the Pennsylvania Railroad here yesterday. The slide, which occurred on the Bigelow boulevard to the downtown passenger terminal of the Pennsylvania Railroad here, nine steam locomotives were working day and night to move the earth which reached the railroad tracks, and approximately 5,000 tons are sent on special trains every 24 hours. The slide began when the city attempted to straighten a curve in the boulevard. Some 200,000 cubic yards of earth had been cut from the hill and dumped into a ravine before the engineers discovered that the earth was moving steadily toward the railroad. Piling driven into the hill failed to stop the movement, and on Monday a two and a half yard building in the path of the slide was buried. Later, the slide moved at the rate of about one foot an hour, and reached a point where it was necessary today for the railroad company to route all trains on the Monongahela division by way of the Fourth avenue station, while suburban service to the east was curtailed through the consolidation of certain trains.

BRITISH M. P. IS GIVEN 6 MONTHS

London, Nov. 19.—Lt.-Col. L'Estrange Malone, Liberal member of the House of Commons, who was arrested in Dublin November 10, for alleged seditious utterances, was today sentenced to six months imprisonment. Two surety bonds of a thousand pounds sterling each were demanded pending an appeal from the judgment of the court.

ALL POLITICAL PRISONERS ARE RELEASED BY GREEK REGENT

Queen Mother Olga Proclaims Amnesty On Assuming Control.

APPEALS FOR UNITY

Athens Comparatively Quiet Despite Change of Government.

London, Nov. 19.—Admiral Countouriotis resigned as Greek regent last night and was succeeded by Queen Mother Olga, says an Athens dispatch to the London Times. Immediately a message to the Hellenic people was issued by the new regent, announcing she had assumed office in conformity with the constitution "on account of the absence of my well-beloved son Constantine." The people were called upon to maintain order, and to do nothing calculated to compromise national peace and prosperity, and the Queen Mother expressed the hope that the people and army, wherever soldiers may be fighting for the national rights of Greece, will do their duty by the country.

MEMBERS OF NEW GREEK MINISTRY VISIT QUEEN MOTHER

Athens, Nov. 19.—Members of the new Greek ministry motored to Takoi Palace last night, and were received by Queen Mother Olga. They informed her that she was by right regent of Greece, pending the arrival of former King Constantine, and she agreed to their views.

ALLIES WILL ACT TO PREVENT RETURN OF FORMER GREEK KING

Paris, Nov. 19.—Allied nations will probably intervene to prevent the return of former King Constantine to the Greek throne, says Charles C. A. Jonart, former French high commissioner in Greece, and at present French ambassador-extraordinary at the Vatican. His views on the situation are set forth in an interview published today by the newspaper Excelsior.

"Constantine," says Mr. Jonart, "seems to me not only undesirable for the Allies, but quite impossible. His return to the throne of Greece would result in the restoration of the monarchy, and the deposition of King Otto. It is the right of the Allies to prevent this, and to allow a Greece that is stronger than ever to become a vassal of Germany."

"It cannot be denied that Constantine acted as an autocrat, and the powers have a perfect right to oppose his return to the throne. A historical precedent may be found for this action. King Otto, the Bavarian monarch of Greece, attempted in 1832 to set up absolute rule in that country. This resulted in Anglo-French intervention, and the deposition of King Otto was required. The Bavarian dynasty was later replaced by one having its origin in Denmark."

PROHIBITION AGENT ROUGHLY HANDLED BY JAIL INMATES

Prisoners Threw Hot Water On Official Awaiting Trial.

Springfield, Ill., Nov. 19.—S. Genn Young of East St. Louis, prohibition enforcement officer, was attacked and beaten by a number of federal prisoners in the county jail here when he was incarcerated on an indictment returned at Madison County charging him with murder. Jail attaches had put Young in the "bull pen" of the jail until a writ of habeas corpus could be secured for his release. While he was awaiting this writ, a number of the prisoners attacked him.

RUSSIAN RADICALS FROM U. S. WERE SENT THROUGH CANADA

Washington, Nov. 19.—By an informal arrangement concluded between the Canadian immigration authorities and the United States department of labor, a number of Russian radicals from the United States were sent through Canada, and are now in the custody of the Canadian authorities at the border, where they were placed on commercial liners sailing for Europe. It was said that the radicals were sent through Canada in the form of a note from a former pastor of the church, Rev. Mr. Trant.

WOODSTOCK MOTHERS AMONG FIRST TO GET CHECKS FOR PENSION

Toronto, Nov. 18.—The first checks issued from the provincial treasury under the provisions of the mothers' allowance act, went out today to Hamilton, Guelph, Kingston, Owen Sound and Woodstock. This is the initial step to put hundreds of mothers on the monthly payroll of the province, the mothers being in similar positions to the civil servants.

BARNES DECLARES BEFORE LEAGUE ASSEMBLY THAT LABOR DESIRES ADMISSION OF EX-ENEMY STATES

British Delegate Says That Industrial Peace Is Essential to Peace of the World—Points Out Necessity of Lending Immediate Assistance to the Armenians.

Geneva, Nov. 19.—Immediate admission of Germany and the other former enemy states to the league of nations was urged before the assembly of the league today by George Barnes, British delegate. Mr. Barnes, representing as he did the laboring people of Great Britain, said Mr. Barnes, he knew that the great majority of them desired that all the enemy states be admitted without delay.

The British delegate recalled the fact that Germany had taken part already in the deliberations of the international labor bureau, established by the league.

"The people of Great Britain, whom I represent here," he said, "do not forget that the central empires plunged the world into war. They do not forget the misery and devastation caused. But the question now is to rescue the world from ruin and the co-operation of the former enemy states is needed."

Mr. Barnes in his speech, which was delivered in the course of discussion on the report to the assembly made by the executive council of the league, spoke approvingly of the action of the council on some questions, but criticized its inaction during the past year while Poland and Soviet Russia were engaged in hostilities. He cited article 11 of the league covenant, providing that any war or threat of war should constitute a matter of concern to the whole league, and that it should take any action deemed wise and effectual to safeguard the peace of nations, and inquired why the council had not taken any action under that article to prevent the Russo-Polish war.

Mr. Barnes pointed out that the world was entirely at the mercy of the few peoples taking charge of their own destinies.

Mr. Barnes dwelt especially on the necessity of lending assistance to the Armenians. "They are," he declared, "hemmed in by the brutal Bolsheviks on one side and by inhuman beings on the other."

The labor chapter would become the most important part of the Treaty of Versailles, Mr. Barnes predicted.

"There can be no permanent peace in the world," he said, "until there is industrial peace, and there can be no industrial peace until labor gets a better share of the product of its labors."

Mr. Barnes referred to the action of the league in the Polish-Lithuanian dispute, and in the question of the island of Hel between Poland and Sweden. He said the council must have support, but he wanted to know why the council had not taken action, as provided for in Article 11 of the league covenant, to prevent the war which had been going on for a year between Poland and Soviet Russia.

The British delegate held that it was quite possible for the league to do something to prevent fresh outbreaks of hostilities between Poland and Soviet Russia, which he declared was unmistakably threatening, in spite of the "patched-up peace."

WOULD HAVE LEAGUE COMMITTEE MEETINGS OPEN TO PUBLIC

Geneva, Nov. 19.—Lord Robert Cecil and Hjalmar Branting, at the first meeting of the committee on disarmament, economic blockade and mandates, yesterday put through a motion that the sessions of the committee be open to the public, thus providing for the first time since the league was formed that the public be allowed to attend the sessions of the committee.
