### THERE IS AN AGREEMENT.

In the letter signed A. G. Mackay in Saturday's Globe, the following words appear:

"It is now stated that in June, 1904, an agreement was made with the C.N.O. Railway Company, and that the mortgage merely carried out the terms of this agreement. The weakness of this explanation is that no such agreement is referred to in the mortgage."

This is an extraordinary statement, in view of the following recital, which is to be found in the mortgage of the 12th July, 1906:

"And whereas, by the said act it is further provided that the granting of the aid by such act authorized shall be subject to certain express terms and conditions to be inserted in an agreement to be executed by the company before the execution of the mortgage or said guarantee; and whereas the said agreement has been duly executed under date the 16th day of June, 1904."

### RIVAL CANDIDATES IN EAST YORK HELD RALLIES

Looks Like Big Vote in the County  
—Richmond Hill Fair To-Day  
County News in Brief:

WEST TORONTO, May 24.—The total number of registrations at the Toronto fair on Wednesday morning till Saturday night at 9 o'clock is 554. There were 163 registrations in Wards 1 and 2, out of a printed list of over 300 names. The notices given out by the press and the city officials seem to not have had much avail in impressing on the people the necessity of registering in order to vote at the coming provincial elections. Official figures show that over 1000 voters are now disfranchised thru failure to register.

Still more evidences of our importance as a city are appearing. It seems that after June 1 Police Magistrate Ellis will hold court every day. The street sweeper will henceforth be used every Tuesday and Friday night instead of in the day time as heretofore.

There are 50 cars of stock in the Union Stock Yards for to-morrow's market.

"Cross-bearing" was the subject of Rev. Thomas Cowan's sermon to-night at the Annette-street Baptist Church. "To be able to follow Jesus in spite of all life's adversities is the duty of every Christian," said Mr. Cowan. Christ's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane was a struggle of the human part of His nature with the divine. His first prayer was "If it be possible let this cup pass from me," but afterwards, when the divinity within Him gained the mastery, Jesus said, "Not my will but thine be done." "Submit your will to His," said Mr. Cowan, "and all will be well."

Messrs. Drury, Grubbe and several other Socialist speakers addressed a large crowd at the corner of Keele and Dundas-street on Saturday evening. The police did not interfere. Mr. Drury stated that if possible they will hold street meetings in town every night till the elections on June 8.

At the Annette-street Methodist Church to-night Rev. Dr. Hargreaves made a strong appeal for uprightness of character, both in public and private life. After commending the life of Queen Victoria as a splendid example of private character, Dr. Hargreaves drifted to the subject of uprightness in public life. "There is really no vital question to be decided in the coming provincial elections," said he. "What we need to see to is that our representatives be men of unblemished character, upright and honest."

#### NORTH TORONTO.

Serious Accident on Metropolitan Was Narrowly Averted.

NORTH TORONTO, May 24.—Councillor Park, who has secured a recreation ground at Gleggsgrove from N. Garland, sr., the consideration for which is to be that the town is to receive Mr. Garland of taxes on the property while in use by the municipality. James Lundy, a well known resident of Deer Park, is suffering from the effect of two hemorrhages, and after a consultation to-day his condition was said to be very low.

The switch leading into the new sheds of the Metropolitan Railway at Deer Park came near causing a bad accident on Tuesday afternoon. A north-bound car going at a good speed was turned by the switch from the main track and derailed. But for this a collision with the cars would have had serious results. The car threw the passengers into a mix up and a man on the rear platform was pitched off the car, but without causing much injury. Passengers on this road think the railway board should order an inspection way board should order an inspection of the company's switches as this is not the first occasion when similar accidents have occurred.

The Anglican mission at Leaside has been entered in the English church records under the new name of St. Catharines. Rev. T. W. Patterson, rector of Christ Church, preached at the church this morning and administered the holy communion.

Thursday being Ascension Day, there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 7 a.m., morning prayers at 9 a.m., evening services with sermon at 8 p.m.

#### SWANSEA.

The little Anglican Church was exceptionally well-attended yesterday. The Right Rev. Bishop Reeve, assisted by the rector, Rev. W. H. H. Sparks, conducted the morning service, holy communion being celebrated by the bishop. Over fifty communicants were partakers at the Lord's table. The service was fully choral, the solos being sung by Miss Helene Scroggys, Miss K. Scroggys, organist. At the confirmation, ministered by the bishop, some fifteen young ladies were presented and were uniformly dressed in white, and wore long white veils, having quite a cloister effect. Nearly half the village witnessed the interesting event.

In the afternoon the Humber Lodge, 279, Sons of England, headed by the Swansea Brass Band, and the Flag of St. George turned out in full muster, this being their second annual church service. They were addressed by Bishop Reeve in an historical vein, taking for his text, "Be ye steadfast in the faith, quit ye like men, be strong." The audience were very much impressed. At the close of the service all joined in singing "Kilting a Star" was appropriately decorated with red and white roses, representing the houses of York and Lancaster.
