CARPENTERS THREATEN STRIKE THIS MORNING

Willing to Accept Reduced Wages But Must Have an Agreement—Catholic Societies at Church.

HAMILTON, May 16.—(Special.)—The contractors and the journeymen carpenters have failed to reach an agreement, and the men say they will strike Monday morning. The employers asked them to accept a cut of two cents an hour, from 27 1/2 cents to 25 cents. This the men are willing to do, but they insisted upon an agreement, and the employers refused to sign one. The reason the employers give for this is that many of the journeymen have set up as contractors. They do not belong to the Master Builders' Association, and are free to pay any wages they see fit, and the master builders say that they do not propose to be bound by an agreement while those outside the association are not.
