MRS. ADAM BECK WINS THE KING EDWARD CUP

Unfavorable Comment Made When Judges Place Myopia Ahead of Stayaway in Jumps.

With hardly a vacant seat in the armchairs the horse show last night presented a brilliant spectacle, the feature event of the evening, the King Edward Cup, going to Mrs. Adam Beck's grand horse, Lady Norfolk, with Lady Warwick, owned by the Ennisclare Farm, a good second. Nine competed in this event, the judges making their decision between the first, two and Duchess of Marlborough, owned by J. T. R. Laurendeau of Montreal, but Mrs. Beck's horse won out on conformation and style.

The pacing class over 15.2 in the afternoon was an exceptionally good class. Miss K. L. Wilks of Galt with Susie O'Connell, with Sam McBride's Sheila W. second. This class was very much better than the one earlier in the afternoon for paces under 15.2.

That good combination horse, Jasme, owned by the Ennisclare Farm, added another win to her credit in the combination class in the evening. Jasme is an ideal combination horse, and was much the better in the class, although there were some good ones.

Crowd and Murray's new purchase, Dress Parade, annexed the trotter class from Sam McBride's Galt. Dress Parade is a very classy looking horse with a great burst of speed and it is no wonder it caught the eye of the spectators.

The last event of the night caused a lot of comment when the judges gave George Wemyss, the trotter class, to Crow and Murray. Stay Away. This pair were brought back twice to go over the jump, but the judges gave the win to the pair who had won the first trial, yet not given a second trial and even a ribbon. It was certainly a bad decision and the crowd did not fail to notice it.
