Bitter Criticism Aroused by the Blunt Announcement of Ancient Regulation.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 5.-Few incidents of the whole war have aroused more bitter criticism than the blunt announcement officially issued by the general, staff that Gen. Stoessel will have to come home to stand court martial for surrendering the fortress of Port Arthur.

While this is an ancient regulation and quite according to law, it is bit terly resented on all sides that such an announcement should have been gratuitously made in the same bulle gratuitously made in the same bulletin containing. Stoessel's appeal to the emperor for "lenient judgment on a garrison reduced to shadows, who have done all that was possible for human beings to uphold the honor of Russia in the face of her enemies."
