



#### LARGE POTENTIAL **MARKET IN STATES**

Between Three and Four Million People Able to Buy Cars Now.

Detroit, Mich.-Between three and four allion people in the United States alone will be able to afford to buy mediumariced automobiles during the selling season, which is now just opening, accorting to a statement by the Liberty Motor Car Company of Detroit. This estimate was based upon research of the govern-ment income tax statistics and other in-

There are only 159,606 people in America with annual incomes of \$10,000 or more, thus showing the limits for the major part of the market for the high-priced cars. This also must be counted as a market for medium-priced cars, inasmuch as many very rich people are known to maintain several cars. For instance, 67 per cent, of the present drivers of the Liberty Six, in the New York area, according to a recent analysis, formerly drove cars in a comparatively high price class, altho the Liberty is a medium-priced car.

On January 1, 1919, there were 4,425,114
personal income tax returns, in addition
to a large number of returns of business
concerns which were able to buy passenger cars. With the rapid growth which
occurred in the last two years, it is safe
to set the present figure at far in excess
of 5,000,000 people or concerns able to afford cars. Out of this number, 1,516,938
people for the year 1918 paid an income
tax on between \$1,000 and \$2,000. The
number should be considered somewhat
higher for the past year. Figuring that
people with incomes of between \$1,000 and
\$2,000 a year form the bulk of the market for low-priced cars, and making other
due allowances, it is computed that between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000, people or
firms are able to buy autos of the medium
price class. Also some non-taxpayers
will buy cars.

Altho many of these people and firms
already have automobiles, it is estimated
that at least 1,500,000 cars are sure to
be junked during the next twelve months,
whereas the total number produced this
past year has only been somewhere
around 2,000,000 cars, and many of those
were shipped to foreign countries.
