WANT CANADIANS IN CANADIAN PULPITS

Warm Debate in Toronto Metho-
dist Conference on Im-
porting Britishers

"Is Ministry a Union?"—Motion is
Carried Asking Inquiry Into Fitness
of Training of Clergy

(Toronto Star)

By an almost unanimous vote, Toron-
to Methodist conference declared to-
day for an inquiry into the training of
Canadian Methodist preachers. "This
action was taken as the direct result
of the action of the ministerial section
in voting by 104 to 30 to admit a Brit-
ish minister, Rev. Trevor Davies, to
conference so that he could take the Met-
ropolitan pulpit."

It was the warmest debate of the
conference so far, and Rev. W. E. Wil-
son of King street east church, who
started it, used some strong language
that provoked much applause.

"When they can't find a man in Cana-
da fit for some of their pulpits there
is something wrong," declared Rev. Mr.
Wilson. "They got a chairman for the
munitions board in Canada, and in the
Methodist church. They got a minister
of militia in Canada, and in the
Methodist church. If Canadian ministers
are not good enough for Canadian pul-
pits there is something wrong with our
training. If you want pulpits orators,
go overseas for them, but if you want men
to shepherd your flocks, give us a chance.
For God's sake don't ask me to spend
my life in the ministry and then tell me
that I'm not fit for my job. There are
big churches that take young men and
lay down a policy for them. They have
the money and they let the minister
know it. It's not fair. I won't bow
down to any golden calf any church may
set up. If we are not being trained
right, then for God's sake train us as
we should be trained."

Asking a Probe

He moved this resolution:
"Whereas, it is manifest that our
methods of obtaining and training men
for the ministry would seem to be in-
adequate, as is evident by the fact that
several times during recent years prom-
inent churches have secured ministers
from the old land; therefore, be it re-
solved that we memorialize the general
conference to appoint a commission to
inquire into our course of study for pro-
bationers, our colleges and everything
connected with ministerial training, and
report at an early date with a view to
remedying the defects."

Rev. Dr. W. H. Hinks said it was a
great mistake for the closure to be ap-
plied in ministerial session, when Rev.

Professor Wallace of Victoria Col-
lege rose to a point of order. "This
criticism of the Ministerial Association
is out of order," he said. "Let us stop it
in the interest of peace."

Rev. A. N. St. John said the closure
came from the floor of conference, not
from the ministers.

Make Ministry a Union?
E. S. Caswell: "Do you propose to
make the Canadian ministry a close cor-
poration? Would you shut all outsiders
out? No matter what a church's needs

may be, you would not be able to get a
man from outside. You would say to
him: 'We have a union here and no one
need apply who has not a union card.'"
Rev. John Morgan, Woodbridge: "This
is a narrow motion. Methodism is
world-wide."
The motion was finally carried almost
unanimously.
