The Library, containing more than three thousand well-selected volumes, is for the use of all the students.

The Recitation Room, Laboratory, and Lecture Rooms, are furnished with Geographical and Astronomical Maps and Globes, and Philosophical, Astronomical, and Chemical Apparatus.

The Geological and Mineralogical Cabinet has been recently increased by the addition of a fine collection of New Brunswick Minerals, Earths, etc., which was made by the late Mr. Payne. This contains about five hundred specimens, all properly labelled and arranged in eight differencess.

A full supply of all the Text Books, Music, Stationery, Materials for Drawing, rainting, etc., needed by students, is kept constantly for sale at the Institution, at the lowest possible prices.
