UNEQUAL CONSCENCES.

Those With Too Much Make Themselves Suffer, and Those With Too Little Make Others Suffer.

"Wealth, as we know," said Mr. Gwimpton, "is very unevenly distributed, but conscience is more so. Some men are overburdened with conscience; some have none at all. Some people worry themselves sick over this or that real or imagined transgression of the civil or the moral law. There are others who worry only that they cannot justify themselves to more."

Between these two extremes we have the man commonly described as over-conscientious, meaning one worthy but timid, who lets a conscience too keen and active keep him from betterments of his fortune that he might otherwise compass. Then we have those people who are not troubled in such ways, who are all but conscienceless and whose conscience really lies dormant.

"It is true, too, that a thing that may stir one man's conscience may not touch another's; we are differently constituted. There appears to be no absolutely definite standard of conscience applicable to and actuating all men alike. This enormously complicates the conscience situation."

"But still the great primary difficulties in the uneven distribution of conscience. If we could only have something like an even distribution of such conscience as now exists it would, for one thing, in some measure reduce privacy in its manifold forms as now practiced under civilized conditions by one without conscience, and for another thing, it would by reducing the stock of the man of abnormal conscience spare him the harassments that now beset him."

and let him take without qualms whatever benefits rightfully belong to him. In fact, a more even distribution of conscience would tone up the world generally and make it in many ways a vastly more comfortable world to live in.

"Pending that happy day it behooves us, I suppose—at any rate, my friend Macblin, a well meaning and cheerful but not always over-trustful man, says I do—do—to be still more or less wary in our dealings with our fellowman in order to avoid subjecting our well meaning but weaker brother to undue temptation, and to avoid being circumvented by somebody who was perhaps over-looked entirely in the conscience distribution."—New York Sun.

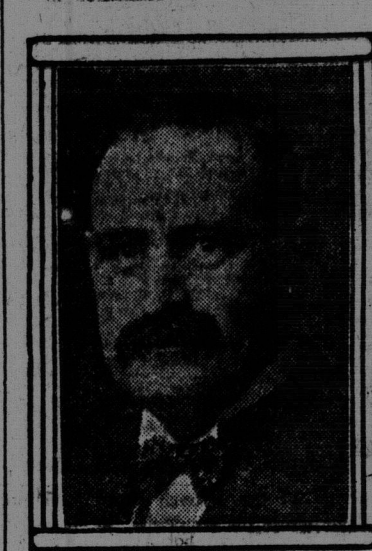

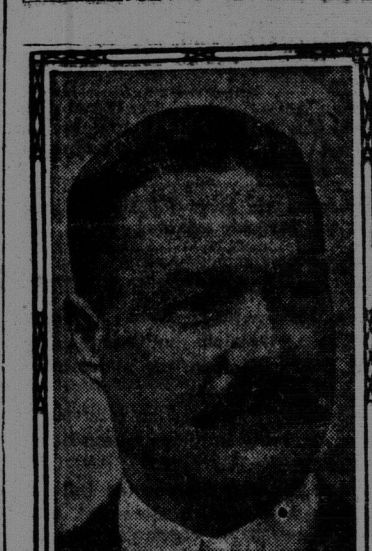

Major Swift, of Quebec, who succeeds Lt.-Col. Watson, who is now in command of a brigade.

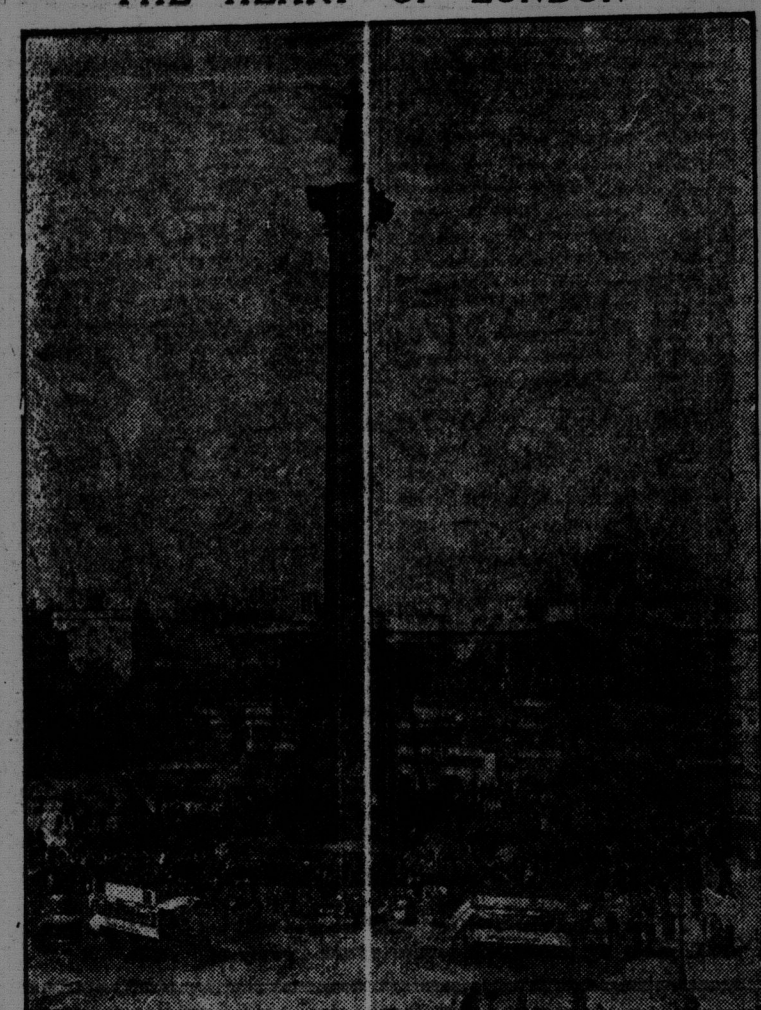

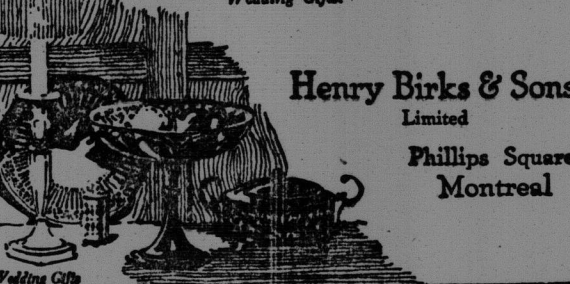

SYDNEY FIREMEN HAVE COMPLAINT ABOUT ONE OF CALAIS RACES

Sydney, N. S., Sept. 12.—Twenty Sydney firemen returned today from Calais where they had been competing in the firemen's sports. They say they were given a raw deal in the horse race, and say it should have been awarded to them.

MORNING WAR NOTES.

An official report in London on Sunday said that another Zeppelin air raid had been made on the east coast of England, but that no one had been injured and that no damage had been done.

On the eastern line of battle the struggle continues unabated. In some parts the Russians are said to be pressing successfully the offensive they began, but in the southern part of the long line along the Galician border the Austrians and Germans are receiving reinforcements by rail and river and are trying to drive to the Dvina. At this point, however, they are only fifty miles from their own frontier.

Owing to arrangements made between the Allies and Holland, and the Allies and Greece, the regulations regarding the export of grain and flour to those countries have been lessened, and both commodities may now be shipped from Canada.

Col. Sir Max Aitken, the official eye witness with the Canadian troops, has sent in a report to the militia department in which he says that the Canadian snipers have proved their superiority over the enemy snipers. He reports that more activity had been shown by the German artillery on the western front, but that the Canadians had steadily improved their lines all round. On Aug. 31 they exploded a defensive mine and at once occupied the crater caused by the explosion.

FAITHFUL MR. TOAD.

Our friend, the toad, for we still regard it as friendly, although it has deceived us once or twice, advises us that it is warmer than we are having showers and that "the long low trill of the toad"—yes, the common or garden toad—joins the shrill staccato popping of the hylas. "We are aware of the fact that it is warmer and that we have had a shower or two, but we are relieved to hear that the toad is coming. Most of the seed is planted, and the sweet peas have sprouted, but we shall not feel that everything is quite as it should be until the toad arrives to take charge of the garden."

There is nobody else we would trust it to, nobody else too apt to be selfish and too lazy to be discontented. There is nobody else wise enough to eat the harmful insects, patient enough to wait for sprinkling time, generous enough to love every plant.

It is ridiculous that some folks prefer the toad's flashy cousin, the frog. Not long ago the question was discussed in one of the magazines and we were asked what gave us our sense of loathing for the garden toad, while the frog, which did nothing but play the dandy and the braggart, was uniformly treated as a good fellow?

"If the toad gulped and croaked all night long," we were asked, "and made his home in slimy pools instead of in the meadow patch, would they reverse their present order in our esteem?" It seems a foolish question or at least a question directed to foolish people.

The only thing a frog is good for is fishing bait, and there is nothing very glorious about that. Those of us who have gardens have never thought of putting Mr. Toad, our chief of police, in the same class with the vagrant frog.

If a toad does not find our garden we go out and find a toad. At least one man is known to have stolen his neighbor's toad, and a number of toads have been brought in from the woods and placed in a residence under a cabbage leaf. It is to be hoped that the toad is right this time and that we can soon turn our gardens over to our faithful Mr. Toad.—Indianapolis News.
