U.S. TO APPEAL LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CASE

PROVINCE GIVEN RIGHT TO GO TO HIGHEST COURT

Abolition of Upper House Matter Now for Privy Council

MELLISH CONTRA

Judgment of Provincial Supreme Court, Which Divided, Is Entered

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 16.—

Special leave to appeal to the judicial committee of the Privy Council was granted this morning by the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia in the matter involving the future of the Legislative Council.

At the suggestion of the law officers of the Crown at Ottawa the questions as to whether or not the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council had the right to appoint members of the Upper House in excess of the traditional complement of twenty-one and as to whether or not the members held office at the pleasure of the Lieut. Governor-in-Council, was referred to the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia in July of this year.

COURT DIVIDED EQUALLY

The court divided equally on the questions submitted and an application for leave to appeal to the Privy Council was granted.

France Defeats U. S. in Competition For International Military Trophy

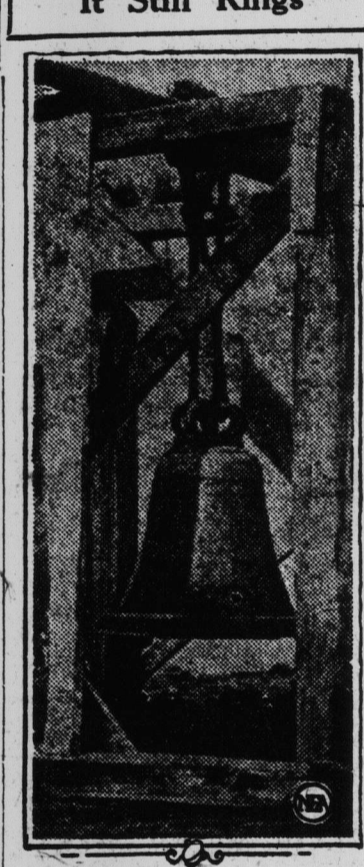

HAVANA, Cuba, Nov. 16.—All parts of Cuba escaped damage from the tropical disturbance which passed over last night, according to reports received this morning.

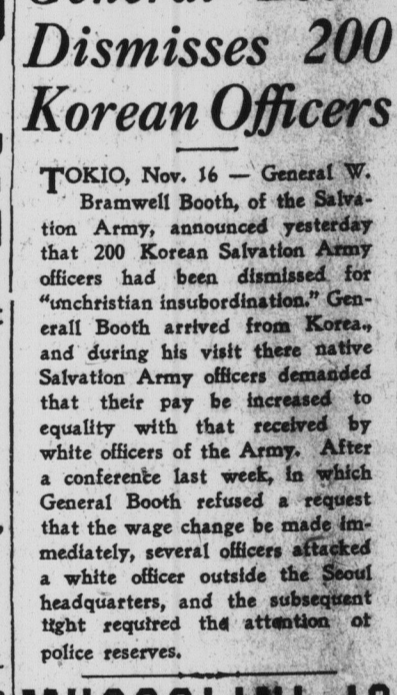

Dominion Must Make Union Profitable For Maritimes, Sir H. Thornton Tells West
