THE city boxing championships will be held here the latter part of this month, according to W. E. Stirling, New Brunswick vice-president of the M. P. B. Probably the greatest amateur boxing exhibition in amateur circles was given in this city within the last few years is the one put up by George Barber, Toronto, and Louis Donovan, of this city, when both of these boys were going good. Any fan who was there will say that was the kingpin. Bruce Winchester and Donovan also have staged some lively contests, while Eric Snow's hectic battle with Donovan is another outstanding affair.

This benching greatly improves the appearance of the show place and is the same as that used at all big shows. It consists of strong galvanized wire, with posts adjustable to any width, the floors and backs being made in this city by Alexander Christie, of the Sterling Lumber Company. C. C. Sullivan, of Saint John, will officiate as judge of all breeds at the show. N. B. Zwicker, of Halifax, secretary of the Nova Scotia Kennel Club, arrived on last evening's train with a dozen dogs from the sister city. He has a Doberman Pinscher, Russian wolfhound, English Bulldog, Spaniel, etc. This is the first Doberman Pinscher to be shown here, and the fancy will have a splendid opportunity of seeing one of the best.

'Good Caddy' By Chick Evans

When a big golf match is in progress, all eyes are riveted upon the players; what they are doing, what they say, their drives, their iron shots and their putts, are of supreme interest to us.

Accompanying them are two silent brayers of golf clubs whose acts are of no importance to the gallery unless they should happen to do something radically wrong. But the actions of these boys or men are of utmost importance to the players. In fact, no one can so completely affect the game of the player himself as his caddy.

Only the player can tell you how much a good caddy means to him. His advice may be of the best, but that after all is the least important part of his service. He knows his player's game, the clubs he is likely to use for different shots; he knows his temper, too, and all the little things that are most likely to influence his game for good or ill. He is always waiting for the tee boxes, and when the other caddies, imitating swings down in the caddy yard or gazing up at some great player. In other words he should know that he is your caddy and act accordingly.

The good caddy shows skill in the management of his bag and in the care of the golf balls. He knows where to stand, when to talk and when to be cheerful and when to be sympathetic, but both cheerfulness and sympathy can easily be overdone. It is because a regular caddy knows the peculiarities of his player that generally speaking he is more useful in a tournament than a caddy taken at random. That, however, is not always the case.
