Just Under Hundred Average
for Bowling Season

Statistics of the City Bowling League

Authority Inculcated.

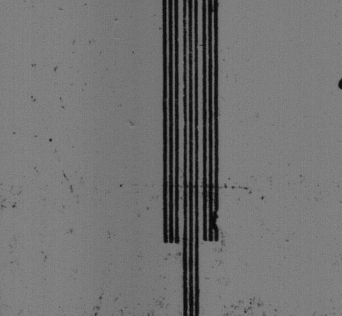
