RACE JOTTINGS.

The old champion Single G. reduced his record and also made a new world's record for three consecutive heats when he defeated Sanardo in the free for all at Atlanta in 1:59, 2:00, 2:00 3-4. The first heat is also the fastest this year and the only one below two minutes.

AMHERST WANTS AN ATHLETIC FIELD

Is in Position to Purchase and Equip at Lot for \$4,000.

(Amherst News.) Will the town of Amherst provide its growing citizens with a proper athletic field, on which they may develop the principles of righteous citizenship, or will its youths to seek kicks on the streets and in the gaming houses? That is the question that is to be decided in Amherst this week. For years the town has needed a properly equipped athletic ground, but always it has been put off. The time has now come for a show down. There is an excellent field available at a minimum cost. It is near the corner of Regent and Agnew streets.

A comparatively small amount of work would have to be done upon it. The total cost involved in purchasing and equipping this lot would not greatly exceed four thousand dollars. The field would easily maintain itself and derive a revenue sufficient to pay the interest, and sink a portion for the principal. The town council will start the ball rolling tonight. It is up to the citizens of the town to get behind the scheme and back it. If you are interested in something that is good for the town, support the issue. A citizens' meeting will shortly be held to consider the advisability of having a ratemakers' vote on the question. In the meantime if you have an ounce of spirit in your makeup, if you have boys that are growing into manhood, if you are interested in good clean manly sport, get around among your friends and talk up the athletic field idea among them. Let's get something started in Amherst that will make life worth living.

BASEBALL.

Attled in New York Again.

New York, Nov. 2.—Abe Attel, former featherweight boxing champion, under indictment in Chicago in connection with the alleged "fixing" of the 1919 world series, returned here yesterday from Montreal and declared he would go soon to Chicago and tell what he knew of the case. He declined to say anything further.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—Attorneys representing Abe Attel and John J. "Sport" Sullivan, indicted as members of an alleged gambling "ring" said to have bribed eight Chicago White Sox players to throw games in the 1919 world series, arrived yesterday from New York to arrange for the appearance of the two. The attorneys announced that they would produce the two men so indicted. Bonds were arranged for and added that they would ask for an early trial.

Franchise for Montreal?

Syracuse, Nov. 2.—It became known here last night that Commander Ross of Montreal is back of a campaign to transfer the Syracuse franchise in the New International League to Montreal. He is said to be negotiating with Ernest Landgraf, owner of the Syracuse franchise and an early decision is looked for.

Montreal, Nov. 2.—Bringing their visit in Montreal to a close, players of Bishop's College School, Lennoxville, played a twelve point draw with the Montreal High School senior team yesterday afternoon. It was one of the best exhibitions of school Rugby seen here in several years and was also a display of courage and gameness seldom surpassed on a local gridiron.

Marin Plestina, who for some years has been camping on the trail of all the leading heavyweight grapplers in the world, defeated Jess Westgard in Montreal last night in straight falls. Plestina is said to be one of the greatest wrestlers in the world, but the men who control wrestling refuse to match him with any of their stars.

THE FIRE AT THE INDUSTRIAL HOME

The Boys' Industrial Home building, used as schoolroom, barn, workshop and gymnasium, was destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon with an estimated loss of \$20,000 with insurance to the extent of \$5,000. The origin of the fire is unknown although it is said that possibly spontaneous combustion or defective wiring was the cause. Besides the building, which was built of brick and four storeys high, there were ten tons of hay, the year's crop of turnips and mangels, and other articles were destroyed. Mayor Schofield presided at a meeting of the board of governors yesterday afternoon and James Myles and H. C. Mott were appointed to make a report of the necessary repairs or the erection of a new building.

MAN HAS ARM TORN OFF BY DITCHING MACHINE

St. Thomas, Ont., Nov. 2.—Roy Dow, of this city, while operating a ditching machine near Sparta, had his left arm torn off. It is supposed Dow bent over the machine to oil it when his smock caught in the mechanism. The unfortunate man was found lying unconscious over the machine and the mangled arm some distance back down the road. Mr. Dow's condition is critical.

MANY THOUSAND VETERANS COMMUTE THEIR PENSIONS

Ottawa, Nov. 2.—The monthly pension bill for soldiers is being reduced about four hundred thousand a month on account of returned men with disabilities from five to fourteen per cent. commuted from their pensions and cashing in instead of drawing a small monthly allowance. Twenty thousand are taking advantage of the commutation privilege and \$5,000 have done so already, and been paid an average of \$430. The total amount paid it \$8,950,000, and when all are commuted it will be nine millions.

THIS PROVINCE INTERESTED

Fredericton Mail: For New Brunswick people the British Columbia election, which has been set for November 1921, has some special interest because two members of the Oliver Government—Hon. J. W. deB. Parris, Attorney-General, and Hon. J. H. King, Minister of Public Works—and the leader of the Opposition—Hon. W. J. Bowser—are of New Brunswick birth. In the last Provincial election in British Columbia held in 1916 the Conservative Government led by Mr. Bowser was defeated and a Liberal Government came into power with Hon. H. C. Brewster—New Brunswick man—as Premier. On Premier Brewster's death in 1918 Hon. John Oliver became the leader of the Ministry.

TRIBUTE TO MR. BURCHILL

Fredericton Mail: While some good men on both sides will disappear from the Legislature as a result of the recent election no man will be so greatly missed as Hon. J. P. Burchill who suffered defeat in Northumberland. Mr. Burchill was the center of the House having been first elected in 1882. His long experience in public life made him invaluable as a legislator particularly in connection with Committee work. No member of the legislature worked harder than Mr. Churchill to serve the interests of the people. As chairman of the important Committee on Corporations he has had few equals and no superiors since Confederation.

NEW GERMAN BANK.

Berlin, Oct. 15. (A. P. Correspondence)—A new bank capitalized at 11,000,000 marks has been organized here by a syndicate of German bankers and industrialists to foster trade relations between Germany and Russia. The new institution will co-operate with Petrograd and Moscow banks as well as with leading Russian industrialists. It is proposed to include the Baltic and border states in the newly formed bank's sphere of influence.

GERMAN WARE.

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—It is not impossible that there will shortly be an endeavor to flood the world's market with cheap enameled ware of German make, says the Weekly Bulletin of the Trade and Commerce Department quoting the British Export Gazette.

BOLSHEVİK PROPAGANDA

Amsterdam, Holland, (A. P. Correspondence), Oct. 15.—The Russian Bolshevik propaganda bureau, formerly centralized here, has now been divided into four sections, so the Dutch newspapers say. One is in South America, one in Berlin, one in Amsterdam and the other in Lisbon, among them handling Bolshevik campaigns for all the world.
