

CHICAGO HAS CRIME WAVE

Four Murders, Two Hundred
And Fifty Crimes in Three Days

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Among the approximately 150 persons taken into custody as a result of the crime wave that swept Chicago in three days, in which holdups, automobile thefts and safe blowings followed in rapid sequence, sixteen men and a woman placed in city jails charged with implication in four murders, 100 saloons, pool room and street holdups, and 150 house burglaries. Members of the band confessed to the more than 250 crimes, police asserted.

But we telephone tamers should take heart. I understand that authorities are experimenting with a new automatic exchange, which will enable one to get through the wrong number without the assistance of the operator.


MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRE

DISTINCTION FOR THOSE MENTIONED IN DESPATCHES

Great Britain Authorizes Oak Leaf—Maple Leaf Suggested For Canadians

(Toronto Star)

A despatch from one of The Star's resident correspondents in London, England, announces that Winston Churchill said in the House of Commons that it was contemplated that those who were mentioned in despatches during the war should have permission to wear a small oak leaf on the ribbon of the Victory medal.

Brig-Gen. Charles H. Mitchell, of the Faculty of Applied Science, explained to The Star today apropos this announcement that the oak leaf had been the sign of victory in British history, and that general officers wore an oak leaf on their caps and staff patches, and that the oak leaf held the same place in British military custom that the laurel did in the French. General Mitchell was very glad to hear of this distinction, as so many men had been mentioned in despatches who were without other decoration, about 80,000 in the British army, about 4,000 in Canada and from the University of Toronto at least 280 men.

The suggestion that among Canadians a maple leaf be substituted for the oak leaf was very interesting. During the war Sir Arthur Currie had issued an order authorizing all Canadian staff officers to wear a maple leaf instead of the oak leaf upon their caps and many of the officers had taken advantage of the regulation, although all of them did not do so, probably on the part of some from the difficulty of obtaining approval for all ranks who had been mentioned in despatches to exchange the maple leaf for the oak leaf would have to be made.

come from Ottawa. Whether the change would be advantageous or not would be an interesting matter for discussion among the 4,000 Canadians who would be entitled to wear the decoration. In some ways it would be more pleasant for all the dominions and the Motherland to wear the same decoration, on the other hand the maple leaf was especially Canadian.

Col. Bartlett Rogers, of the Third Battalion, was delighted with the idea of erecting these had been "mentioned." They would now have something to show for it. From the Third Battalion 88 men had been mentioned in despatches, and of these twenty had no other decoration. The maple leaf would be just as good and more distinctive to Canadians than the oak leaf and all Canadian "mentioned" had been at the recommendation of Canadian officers; for instance, most of the Third Battalion "mentioned" had been recommended by Col. Rogers himself.

The Chinese government has floated a note issue of \$5,000,000 in England to pay for a contract for a large number of commercial airplanes placed with Vickers, Ltd. The English firm will erect hangars in China and send out pilots to train the Chinese to take the air.
