THE TYPHOID SITUATION

A conference of the board of health officials was held this morning. Those present were: Dr. G. G. Melvin, chief medical health officer for the province; Dr. J. P. L. Brown, district medical health officer for the city and county; T. M. Burns, secretary for the board of health here, and Solomon McConnell, chief inspector for the city and county. The lists of typhoid cases were gone over and the sanitary conditions, milk supply and water supply of each family in which the disease had broken out were discussed. It was decided to visit the homes of the patients and look into the matter more fully, and immediately following the meeting this campaign was begun.

In September nineteen local cases of typhoid have been reported to the board of health, but yesterday and today no additional cases were reported.

In speaking to the Times this morning, Dr. Hedden said a temporary let-up in the admission of cases to the hospital had taken place and as yet no action regarding further accommodation, has been necessary. If more cases should be admitted private rooms on the top floor will be utilized and in case of dire necessity tents may be used.
