**RALLY DAY WAS OBSERVED IN THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS**

At the Sunday school rallies in the city churches yesterday large gatherings attended and the services were held to make the opening of the winter programme.

In the German street Baptist church, in addition to the part taken by the teachers and pupils, Captain Rev. F. S. Porter, the former pastor, spoke eloquently on the subject, "What Our Home Means to Us." In speaking on this subject he referred to the special pleasure it was to again be among his former parishioners. Miss Maud March and S. H. Davis took part in the service. W. F. Nobles moved that a vote of thanks be extended to R. G. Haley, who worked in the Sunday school. The motion was seconded by Rev. S. S. Poole and passed by a standing vote.

Rally day was observed in the First Presbyterian church, West St. John, yesterday afternoon and the service prepared by the board, with the subject "The Home," was used. The associate superintendent, Leonard Wilson, presided and was supported by Honorary Superintendent J. L. Cameron and Superintendent A. W. Fraser. Miss Edith McLean presided at the piano and the singing was under the leadership of Percy Cruikshank. Rev. D. Morison, pastor of the church, gave an address on the subject, "What Our Home Means to Us." The school regrets the loss of Mrs. J. L. Duval, who is moving to Montreal.

Yesterday in the Exmouth street church the Sunday school commenced the celebration of its sixtieth anniversary, which will be continued during the week with a banquet and concluded next Sunday with the rally day services, at which the portrait of Harry Macdonald, who was killed in action, will be unveiled.

The Sunday school service yesterday was an open one and was addressed by the former superintendents. The present superintendent, E. E. Thomas, presided and read the historical account of the school. Those who spoke were all listened to with great interest. They were William Baxter, W. A. Adams, George N. Green, J. King Kelley, Hor. H. A. McKown and James Myles. The pastor, Rev. G. F. Dawson, opened the meeting with prayer.

In the auditorium of the church, St. David's Sunday school held its twenty-fourth annual rally yesterday. The service prepared by the Sabbath school committee of the general assembly, entitled "Home," was carried out. Rev. Mr. Farquhar gave the address on the Sunday school and the hymn "O Happy Home," while Miss Gladys Fowler presided at the piano and F. J. Punter led the singing. A message from the minister, Rev. J. A. MacKiegan, was read by Robert Reid, the superintendent, in which was expressed the deepest regret that he was not able to attend the services and also conveyed his heartiest greetings to the teachers, officers and scholars of the school. The associate superintendent, D. W. Magee, made a few remarks. A feature of the service was the presentation of a diploma to Jean McPhee for reading verses of Scripture and the shorter catechisms.

Yesterday was rally day in St. Mary's Sunday school and most successful services were conducted by Rev. B. Taylor McKim, the rector. A keen membership campaign has been recently carried on and over fifty new members added to the attendance roll of the school. The leaders of the two campaigns were Miss E. B. Mitchell and Miss McPhee. The rally was held yesterday afternoon at 8 o'clock and a fine programme of hymns, songs, recitations and exercises carried out by the members of the school from primary to senior classes. Mr. A. A. McGregg, boys' work secretary for the M.C.C.A. in the maritime provinces, gave a stirring address and the St. Mary's orchestra rendered accompaniments for the hymns and songs.

At St. Bartholomew's church, Glen Falls, a thanksgiving service was held last evening. The church was beautifully decorated with the fruits of the harvest. In connection with the evening service a new Bible, a hymn board and a lectern were dedicated to J. N. Rogers. St. Mary's orchestra was in attendance, and Miss Edith Morrison officiated at the organ.

Knox Presbyterian church and Sunday school held their annual rally day yesterday. Capt. Rev. Thomas Harrison preached both services of the church and addressed the Sunday school rally in the afternoon. His sermons, morning and evening, were heard with great pleasure by large congregations. In the morning he spoke on Christian growth explaining in his own peculiarly interesting way the idea and growth of a human soul to Christian perfection.

**Big Advance in Furs.**  
Prices obtained for furs at the Fursten auction fur sale in New York show big advances over the bids obtained in April. Alaska seal skins, for instance, were 30 per cent higher, blue fox 185 per cent, bear 40 per cent, red fox 15 per cent, ermine 40 per cent, silver fox 75 per cent, lynx 20 per cent, muskrat 70 per cent, marmots 75 per cent, Australian rabbit from 50 to 125 per cent, chinchilla 100 per cent, beaver 40 per cent, and, in fact, almost every kind of skin sold at substantial advances over the spring auction. This was the largest sale in the history of the fur auction in New York and comprised skins from practically all the fur-producing countries, the total value of which amounted to \$15,334,550.
