**REMOVE I. C. R. TRACKS NOW CROSSING THE HAYMARKET SQUARE**

This Will Follow Completion of Overhead Crossing of the Marsh Road—May Be Change in Plan

In order to carry out Mr. Gutell's plan for the overhead crossing on the Marsh road in connection with the new I. C. R. branch line to Courtenay Bay, it may be necessary to make a slight amendment to the plan which has been filed at the registry office. An overhead crossing was one of the important features of the scheme but under the present plan it will probably be found to secure sufficient elevation in the distance from the main tracks to the Marsh road to get the branch line high enough. The original idea was to divert the Marsh road to the eastward opposite the One Mile House and the entrance to "Woodside" in order to give more room to raise the railway line to the proper height.

Most of the property needed has been secured by options but for several holdings which will be needed no price has yet been fixed and these claims will be adjusted in the Exchange Court.

**TICKET WAS IN OVERCOAT POCKET**

Train Case Brings Court Comment on Police Search and Liquor Drinking

John Smith, was given in charge by I. C. R. Policeman Smith on Saturday night charged by Conductor Patterson of the Boston express with refusing to pay his fare from Fredericton Junction to the city. He was brought before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning and was charged with stealing a ride on the train but when he produced his ticket in court he was allowed to go.

Policeman Smith testified that Conductor Patterson had wired him to be ready to take a man who refused to pay his fare. Smith said the prisoner who had been drinking told him he had he could not pay it. He admitted being drinking and said that when he looked for his ticket while he was in jail yesterday he found it in his overcoat pocket. The ticket was produced in court. It had been purchased by the conductor on the Fredericton branch.

The magistrate then asked Policeman Smith for an explanation, "You could not have made much of a search when the ticket was found in his outside overcoat pocket?"

Policeman Smith: "Does not Your Honor think that the prisoner should have made the search?"

The Magistrate: "Is it possible that you do not understand me? You said the ticket was found in his overcoat pocket. Here is the ticket. You must be more careful in future."

The magistrate told the prisoner he had got himself into this trouble on account of drinking. He asked where he got the liquor since Fredericton was a Scott Act town. "It may be Scott Act," replied the prisoner, "but they sell liquor just the same. I bought a flask just before leaving."

The case was dismissed.

**SOCIAL REFORM LEAGUE BACKED BY CHURCHES IN COMMUNITY WORK**

In an address to the Men's Brotherhood of Centenary church yesterday afternoon, A. M. Belding said:—

"I do not know of any movement that could be begun in St. John that would be so pregnant of social and moral good in the community as for a small group of wise men from each church to get together, organize themselves into a social reform league, discover their points of agreement in relation to social welfare, and then address themselves with prudence, hearty co-operation and in the most determined spirit, to the formulation of a community programme, which would gather force as it developed, and within a reasonable period under wise leadership, do a very great deal for social betterment."

The speaker suggested that Centenary Brotherhood might very fittingly originate the movement, and communicate with the other churches of the city, of all denominations, asking that delegates be appointed to meet to consider a tentative programme, which would include reforms upon the need of which all would agree; and this league, having behind it the driving force of all the churches, would be able to accomplish its ends.
