ANNUAL ADDRESS TO MANUFACTURERS

President Gourlay's Explanation Of The Financial Stringency

THE SOLELY TO EXCESS OF THE IMPORTS OVER THE EXPORTS

His Remedy is Greater Encouragement to Manufacturers—A Good Word For The Banks—Demands For Higher Tariff For Wool and Iron Products—London Hears of Revision, But Not Upward

Halifax, Sept. 17.—In the presence of over two hundred delegates from all parts of the Dominion the annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association was opened here this morning.

The situation so far as Canada is concerned is not so bright as it appears to be. The fact that Canada is financing her rapid numerical increase of population by the sale of her natural resources is unquestioned, but that wealth has not yet been converted into money, or into merchantable commodities that can be used to pay our debts.
