FLEMMING GOVERNMENT GIVEN A SORRY DAY

Fredericton, April 18.—The most important item in the estimates—\$70,000 for roads and bridges—caused a sharp debate in the legislature this afternoon and resulted in an utter repudiation of the "public-works-by-public-fund" policy of the government which was emphasized so loudly by them when in opposition. This declaration came from Chief Commissioner Morrissey, of the public works department. He was also forced to acknowledge that after deducting \$50,000 to repay the deficit and \$130,000 already spent there would only remain \$60,000 to spend during the balance of the year until Oct. 31, upon the roads and bridges of the province, as compared with over \$270,000 spent last year outside of the amount of the deficit.

The amount expended upon public works down to the date the session opened was \$108,000 and of this amount Chief Morrissey said about \$125,000 or \$130,000 was for roads and bridges. This brought the sharp rejoinder from Mr. Copp that there must have been an enormous array of unpaid bills on Oct. 31, last, in spite of the assertions of the government to the contrary. It was surely a triumphant session for the opposition. Never was criticism so weakly replied to; never did the government show up in a worse light than this afternoon when their broken pledges and their altered policy upon which they obtained power was ruthlessly laid bare by that opposition leader and members. Messrs. Tweeddale, Upham, LaBrosse, Ger, Dyne, Burchill, Bentley, all took part in the debate and strongly urged that here should be reform. The passing of supply was completed at 5:30. There will probably be some supplementary estimates.

GEO. GRAHAM OF TORONTO IS SOUGHT IN VAIN

New York Wire to His Wife Ends Her Hope

DOWN WITH HONORED DEAD

Nephew Describes Scene at Carpathia Pier as Heartrending—Mother Scans Every Face as Survivors Land, But Daughter's is Not Seen

(Canadian Press)

New York, April 18.—"George Graham is not on the boat," such was the dismal intelligence conveyed to his wife in Toronto by a telegram from here. Despite all the hopes of those who waited to welcome him it is evident that he must be numbered among the missing, among the honorable and honored dead who went down that women and little ones might live.

It was a long wait. The minutes dragged like hours. At last a few survivors from the Titanic began to arrive. A few male relatives of ladies on the ill-fated boat were interviewed in the corridors and had to tell their second hand story over and over.

But the Canadians came not. Hours dragged on and hope gradually sank in the breasts of those who were awaiting news of Mr. Graham. W. C. Graham, nephew of the unfortunate man, was heartbroken over the result. "I can't realize it," he said, "I can't realize it. The whole thing just numbs me. I have seen sights tonight which I will remember as long as I live. I have seen people clapping their loved ones in their arms. I have heard cries of joy which they uttered. But I have also heard the shrieks of a poor woman who waited and waited in vain. In the two hours she was at the pier waiting for her mother, she scanned every soul who left the boat. At last all were gone. She stood waiting. Then some one told her gently that it was no use. She shrieked pitifully and when they carried her away she was in a dead faint."

WOMAN'S PLACE IN THE HOME

Prominent Lady, in Place Where Suffragists Have Won Much Causes Sensation

Copenhagen, April 18.—Dr. Lis Jacobsen, M. A., a daughter of the permanent secretary to the exchange, who for many years has been in the front rank of woman emancipation, has caused a mild sensation by reading a paper at the leading ladies' club here, dealing with feminism. To the great surprise of the audience, Mrs. Jacobsen summed up her experiences by saying that the woman movement had taken an entirely wrong turning. To bear children and to educate them properly was the great problem with which every woman had to occupy her mind. It would be gratifying if the women in the future state should try to obtain offices in the cabinet, in the diplomatic or ecclesiastical service, or even employment as artisans. Mothers and good mothers that was their destination; and good grand work for the home, that was the serious problem which they had to solve. Doctor Jacobsen would not waste any words upon the question of woman suffrage, which she declared, was the biggest blunder of all, because the political struggle in all countries was not woman against man, but a fight between the upper class and the lower class. Taking into consideration that this speech has been delivered in the country where feminism was first encouraged, the lecture—especially as being given by one of the most prominent ladies in the country, one who holds office in the university—has caused a great sensation.
