## C. N. R. Agrees to Provincial Taxation; Revenue \$90,000 to \$100,000

British Budget Passes In One Session; Ottawa At It More Than Month; End Is Not Yet

By Canadian Press.

1 TAWA, April 29.—Debates on the budget in Ottawa and Westminster this year, afford a curious comparison in methods. Cable despatches indicate that although the Chancellor of the Exchequer only submitted his budget yesterday. the resolutions were adopted before the House adjourned. Budget and debate were over in a single sitting.

Here the budget was brought down on March 24. With the exception of a few days recess at Easter, the House has discussed budget ever since. There have been nearly 100 speeches. And, even with that, the debate is not scheduled to close before Friday morning. A special committee is working on a new rule to limit speeches.
