BOXING IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Nov. 22.—By outfighting Joe Burns, the local featherweight, in eight rounds of a scheduled ten round bout at Sohmer Park last night, Eddie Wallace, of Brooklyn, earned the honors of the bout. Wallace had a margin in every round, with the exception of the seventh and ninth, in which Burns showed at his best, although he had claimed an injury to his right hand in the early stages. The bout was the first of a series to be given by the Canadian Hockey Club and was witnessed by the largest crowd that has attended a boxing event here since the outbreak of the war.
