## THE 38th ANNUAL REPORT.

The 38th Annual Meeting of the friends of the Protestant Orphans' Home calls for most devout thankfulness to the Giver of Life with all its mercies, from those intimately associated with and interested in the children.

While never wishing to boast of good health, they still gladly acknowledge the exemption from serious illness; although once or twice it was thought advisable to transfer cases to the hospital. One boy was also sent to the asylum at Orillia, being of a defective mental capacity.

Seventy-two children have been admitted since May, 1888.

Of these 47 were boys and 25 girls.

According to religious denominations as follows:—Presbyterians, 11; Methodists, 11; Baptists, 2; Salvation Army, 1; Church of England, 40 and Protestants not specified, 7.

Seventy-six children have been discharged from the Home. 47 taken by relatives, 3 little girls adopted, 1 boy ran away, 20 children were apprenticed, of whom 4 were girls and 16 boys.

Total average per month in the Home, 172. Including the

Matron and staff, 181.
