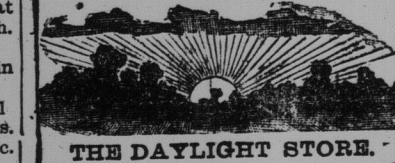

The local baseball executive committee will meet this evening in the Y. M. C. A. rooms at eight o'clock sharp. As business of importance will be brought before the meeting a full attendance is requested.

In compliance with a petition the Board of School Trustees are placing a new enclosure around the Winter street school. The requisition was signed by ninety-nine residents of the vicinity.

The superintendent of the fire alarm yesterday installed a new signal box, No. 215, at the C. P. R. elevator, Carleton. It was afterwards tested and found to work all right. The superintendent also tested four boxes on the freight sheds.

Mr. Drinkwater, secretary of the Canadian Pacific Railway, arrived in the city today in Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's private car, Metaphia. Sir William Van Horne and Sir Thomas Shaughnessy are expected to arrive here today.

Clarence Sponser, who has been connected with the press in this province for some years, is now canvassing in Halifax and other Nova Scotia towns along the I. C. R., with the intention of publishing a railway hotel paper for the maritime provinces.

Traffic Manager Tiffin, of the I. C. R., passed through the city last evening on his way to Boston, where he is inspecting the recent acquisition of the government, the Canada Eastern railway. While Mr. Tiffin found the Canadian Eastern in very good condition, he says that many improvements will be made.

CHARGED WITH THEFT.
Robert Dixon, accused of Stealing Money From a North End Hebrew.

Robert Dixon was arrested this morning by the North End police on suspicion of having broken into John Cohen's home on Main street, where he denies having been in the house, while Mrs. Cohen says she saw him in the house. Four dollars and seventy cents were stolen from Mr. Cohen's trouser pockets.

The police are satisfied that they have the right man, as Mrs. Cohen is positive in her identification. When Dixon was searched only a few cents was found on his person. Some years ago he was sentenced to four years in Dorchester for stealing, but persists to this day that he was not guilty.

NO CHANGE IN WINTER SCHEDULE.
General Superintendent Dowdle and District Passenger Agent C. B. Foster, of the C. P. R., returned this morning from Boston, where they attended a meeting of railway men called together to arrange the winter schedule, which will go into effect on Oct. 10th. There will be no change from last winter's arrangement so far as St. John is concerned.

A new departure for the I. C. R., and will be the first through sleeper from St. John in connection with the new train. The sleeper now attached to the 7 p. m. train will be taken off on above date.

PORTLANDS WILL AGREE.
The Portlanders yesterday issued a sweeping challenge, that was promptly accepted by the Franklins with the condition that one of the games at least should be played on the Victoria grounds. To this the Portlanders have agreed and their representative will meet Manager Dunham, of the Franklins, at Myles Carrol's store this evening to arrange details. Three games will be played, each side putting up one hundred dollars, the team winning two to take the money.

WORK FOR THE G. P. S.
The fall gang recently re-inforced by several former members, is doing good work on the road leading from Kane's corner to the one mile house. When this work is finished they may be sent to the park to do some necessary work there. The gang at present is not as large as it was some little time ago, the trouble being that there is now in jail several who should be at work, but who, it is feared, would make trouble if sent out.

I. O. O. F. OFFICERS.

Chas. A. Sampson of Fredericton Grand Master—Lively Contest For Grand Wardenship.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 11.—Yesterday afternoon the members of Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., were welcomed by the mayor and corporation. After the reception the Grand Lodge went into session and discussed committee work. A short evening session was held at which a committee was appointed to consider the best means of celebrating the jubilee next year.

The lodge adjourned about nine and paid a visitation to Rebekah lodge, where degrees were accomplished.

The Oddfellows' convention assembled this morning and after considering the reports of committees proceeded to the election of officers.

Chas. A. Sampson, of Fredericton, was unanimously elected Grand Master and J. Smith, Windsor, N. S., Deputy Grand Master.

For the position of Grand Warden there were five nominees. Several ballots were taken and after a lively contest Dr. A. S. Walker, of Truro, was elected. The election of the officers was left until the meeting this evening.

BARBOUR'S REPORT SUBMITTED.
It Will Probably be Presented to Water and Sewerage Board Tomorrow Afternoon.

Mayor White, who has been up river for a few days, was back at his desk this morning and spent a busy day. For a long time he was closeted with Engineer Barbour, who has his report on the city's water supply ready. It is understood that Mr. Barbour has presented his report to the mayor. The Water and Sewerage Board, of which his worship is chairman, has been called to meet tomorrow afternoon and the report will then be read.

This afternoon there will be a meeting of the Board of Works. Messrs. McDougall and J. Smith, representing the Anglo-Canadian Cold Storage Corporation will be present at this meeting in connection with an option on a site on the West Side given them some years ago. This option has expired and they are desirous of having it renewed.

NEW I. C. R. PAY SYSTEM.
Men Get Cheques Instead of Cash Today for the First Time.

The I. C. R. pay car arrived today and a new method of paying the men is being followed out that the officials do not seem to take kindly to, but is approved by the auditor general. Today the men are being paid by check. Previously they were given the money in cash, but now when they sign the check they are given a check that was made out in Moncton. This they endorse and take to the other end of the car, where a bank representative has an office and cashes the checks. Just what the object is of this procedure is no known, unless that it places the risk of carrying a large amount of money on the bank instead of the railway company.

It is estimated that about \$20,000 is paid out here each month.

POLICE COURT.
In the police court this morning Joseph Lenihan was fined \$8 or two months in jail for being drunk in the I. C. R. yard. Joseph has also a bill of twenty-five cents against him for cartage.

Charles Meyers was found drunk on the Marsh road by Officer Burchill and this morning was fined \$8 or thirty days. He also had to be carted to the station. One common drunk paid four dollars.

Welcome to Col. and Mrs. Sharp at the Log Cabin Fishing Club is the proud possessor of a handsome new flag which will float over its club house at Loch Lomond. The flag, which was just completed yesterday, and is designed in the club colors, consists of a border of red surrounding a ground of yellow, upon which, in letters of blue are the letters L. C. F. and the club motto: "We Live in Hope." In the centre of the flag is the club's sign, an anchor.

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GONE WRONG AGAIN.
The water pipe that feeds the fountain in King square has gone wrong again and for the third or fourth time this year the asphalt walk under which it is laid has had to be dug up. The trouble is that the roots of the trees damage the terra cotta pipe. The trouble could be removed by the substitution of an iron pipe for the one now in use.

SQUABBLE AT THE ASYLUM.
Premier Tweedie is holding a private investigation at the government rooms Church street, this afternoon. It is reported that the investigation is into some disagreement which occurred at the asylum some time ago.

Premier Tweedie would say nothing in regard to the object of the investigation.

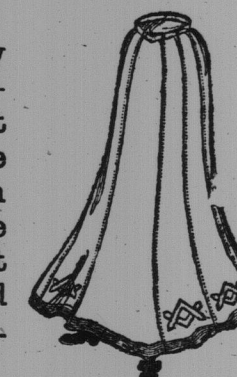
