THE WEATHER

Point Lepreau, north-east winds, 8 miles at 11 a. m. Highest temperature during last 24 hours, 8. Lowest temperature during last 24 hours, 2 below. Temperature at noon, 7.

LOCAL NEWS.

An Imperial Oil Company sled was upset on the Marsh Road yesterday afternoon and received some damage.

The death occurred yesterday at Orono, Me., of Jack Kenny. He is survived by his wife, two sons, three brothers and two sisters.

A horse attached to a delivery sled ran away on King street yesterday morning and was captured on north side of King Square before any damage was done.

At the meeting of the Everyday Club tonight the making of rules and the strengthening of committees will be considered. A full attendance is expected.

The Boston and Atlantic trains were on time today. The trainmen report that the line is all clear. Yesterday's storm only interfered with the service for a short time.

At St. Andrew's curling rink this morning the finals for the ladies' cup were played, and after a close match Miss Helen Smith's rink defeated that of Mrs. J. P. Barnes.

Mr. and Mrs. William Caples will have the sympathy of their friends in the death of their little daughter, Annie Gertrude, aged three years and eleven months, who died at her home, 102 March Road, yesterday.

The Fortnightly Club met last evening at the residence of Allan H. Wetmore, 60 Mecklenburg street. Papers were read by W. H. Harrison and Dr. Bedell. An interesting discussion followed.

The committee in charge of the Free Kindergarten are planning a Japanese tea and entertainment to be held from four till six o'clock on Saturday in the schoolroom of St. David's church. A pleasing programme has been prepared which includes solos by little Miss Marion Campbell. There will also be a candy table provided.

Mr. James Bond, Jr., barber of Mill street, met with a very painful accident this morning. He was walking across the floor of his shop when his foot slipped and he fell, breaking his ankle. Dr. J. A. McIntyre was summoned and attended to the injury, but Mr. Bond will be laid up for some time.

The chemical works and No. 2 hose reel were this morning about 9.30 o'clock summoned by a still alarm to James McKenney's house on the corner of broad and Charlotte streets. While in the process of thawing out a water pipe a wooden casing caught fire. The damage was not much and the fire was extinguished by a dash from the chemical.

Claims for damages which will likely aggregate a large sum will be presented to the intercolonial management as a result of the collision of trains near Beaver Brook, on the North Shore division, in which one man was killed and twenty-six injured—several seriously. R. A. Lawlor, K. C., of New Brunswick, represents the claimants, who include all the injured and the relatives of the man who was killed. It is not known yet what sum will be asked in the individual cases.

W. F. Robertson, of the National Drug and Chemical Company, received a letter this morning from Murray Harmer, of Norton, who says that yesterday his father, Elias Harmer, was struck over the ear by a piece of lumber which fell off a car and as a result is confined to his home. The doctor who attended the injured man says that he does not think that the skull is fractured but there is an ugly scalp wound. It is expected that the popular general store proprietor will be around again in a few days.

Mr. George W. Parker returned yesterday from Toronto where he had been attending the annual meeting of the Confederation Life Association. While in Toronto Mr. Parker received a very complimentary offer, which he has after some hesitation decided to accept, to make an extended tour of Canada in the interests of the company. He is to leave for the west about the first of April. During Mr. Parker's absence the office of Provincial manager for New Brunswick will be vacant, and an opening is now offered for the right man. A lucrative salary will be paid and a permanent contract can be secured.

An enjoyable entertainment was given in Centenary Sunday school last evening by the members of the Young People's Association. The programme was in charge of Miss Helen MacMichael and included vocal solos by Mrs. Buchanan, Charles Knight and Mr. Dickerson, piano duets by Misses Sprague and Miss Thorne, a paper read by Miss Hattie Allen, and explanations of the various selections read by Miss Annie Whitaker. FATHER FORCIBLY SEIZED HIS CHILD

Episode Which Has Caused a Sensation in Andover

D. R. Bedell Held up Mrs. Wiley's Sleigh

Dragged Woman to the Road and Took Possession of His Daughter.

The peace loving people of the village of Andover, Carleton county, received a rude shock on Friday last, when a most unusual incident occurred. Feeling in the village runs high, and it is difficult to obtain both sides of the story, but the facts as learned by the Star are as follows:

Some three years ago Mrs. D. R. Bedell died when giving birth to a child. As Mr. Bedell had no near relatives living in the village, Mrs. Mary Wiley, a sister of Mrs. Bedell, and widow of Dr. Robert Wiley, volunteered to look after the infant. Her suggestion was accepted by Mr. Bedell and since that time Mrs. Bedell has lavished on the baby all a mother's care and has become as much attached to the little girl as if she were her own.

Mr. Bedell has never expressed any willingness to give the child to Mrs. Wiley, and beyond making a request that such would be done Mrs. Wiley has not taken any action which could be interpreted as showing that she refused to give up the child. Both parties live in the village within a short distance of each other and could easily have met to talk over the situation.

In October last Mr. Bedell decided to take care of his little girl himself, and though Mrs. Wiley was loath to do so, she made no serious objection. However, Mr. Bedell a little later understood that he was to be away from home for some months and arranged that his daughter should remain with Mrs. Wiley until spring.

There was no thought of any ill feeling until Friday last. On that day Mrs. Wiley accompanied by her sister, Miss Annie Magill, and the child, went out for a drive. They were shortly followed by Mr. Bedell who was accompanied by Miss Smith, of Woodstock, a cousin of the present Mrs. Bedell, driving close behind. As Mrs. Wiley was turning her sleigh around near the court house she was stopped by Mr. Bedell and was forcibly dragged from the sleigh and thrown to the ground. The child was also taken from the sleigh, and with the assistance of Miss Smith was carried into the court house.

During the assault William Miller, who was unloading wood at the court house, was asked by Mr. Bedell to assist and complied by holding Mrs. Wiley's horse by the head, preventing Mrs. Wiley from eluding Mr. Bedell. Mrs. Wiley was driven to her home and has since been under the care of a physician, suffering from painful bruises on her arms and head. She has placed the matter in the hands of Titus Carter, attorney, who will take action against Mr. Bedell for assault. The child is now at Mr. Bedell's home. This incident has created a great sensation in Andover.

WILL BUILD A NEW LOOKUP AT THE I. C. R.

Some weeks ago the government abandoned the lookup for prisoners in the I. C. R. station and now when an arrest is made the nearest lookups are North End police station and in the ferry building. The I. C. R. authorities and Chief of Police Clark have been talking the matter over and the government will build a brick lookup on their grounds near the depot. When erected it will have a couple of cells and will be looked after by the local police force. Chief Clark and the I. C. R. officials will probably pick out a site for the new lookup this afternoon.

DR. FISHER ARRIVES AND GOES TO MUSQUASH

Doctors and Railways Instructed to Take All Precaution.

Dr. E. Bayard Fisher of Fredericton arrived in the city this morning. The provincial health officer came here for the purpose of visiting the Ingewood lumber camp at Musquash, where several cases of smallpox are reported. Dr. Fisher was driven to Musquash at 9.30 this morning by Mr. Knight.

The C. P. and N. B. Southern railways have been notified that cases of smallpox exist at Musquash, and they are requested to not serve transportation to any from the infected camp. The rooms occupied by the men at Ingewood have already been disinfected. The doctors who are now at Musquash have been directed to examine the men in the eight adjoining camps.

SOLOMON STEEVES.

HOPEWELL HILL, Feb. 16.—Solomon Steeves, an old and well-known resident of Demoselle Creek, died at his home there last night, from an attack of pneumonia following La Grippe. Mr. Steeves, who was about 75 years of age, was a successful farmer and lumberer, and owned a large and valuable property. He is survived by his wife, who is now lying critically ill, and one son, Roland Steeves, and a daughter, Mrs. Minnie McLaughlin, residing on the homestead. Councilor Steeves, an old resident of Demoselle Creek, is a brother of the deceased.

WITNESS TOO DRUNK TO GIVE EVIDENCE

And Says He is Seldom Any More Sober

—The Burns Liquor Selling Case.

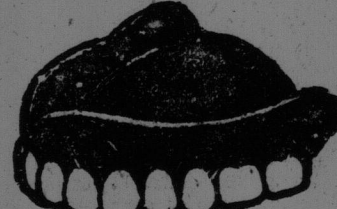
Mrs. Thomas Burns was charged in the police court this morning with illegally selling liquor on Sunday last and pleaded not guilty. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the defense.

Policeman Marshall gave evidence that John Grant, who claimed to have had his boots stolen in a Sheffield St. house on Sunday, gave John O'Leary a five dollar bill, that O'Leary went into Mrs. Burns' house and when he returned he had a bottle of liquor. Grant was put on the stand and said he gave O'Leary \$5 for liquor and got only \$2 and some small change back; O'Leary caused a laugh when he said he had been drinking liquor for the past 25 years.

The court then tried to arrange an hour that would be more suitable for the witness to appear in a better condition, and while trying to do this O'Leary caused a laugh when he said he commenced drinking as soon as the bars opened.

The magistrate adjourned the case until tomorrow morning at 9.30 o'clock, and incidentally remarked that if a witness was not in condition to give evidence he had better be committed to jail until he was fit.

Two drunks were fined the usual amount in the police court this morning.
