CHICAGO, May 11.—John Larson, of Chicago, a nephew of Mrs. Guinness expects to go to Laporte today or tomorrow to see if he can establish beyond a doubt whether Mrs. Guinness perished in the flames of her home.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., May 11.—Five children of James Kennedy a well known negro of this city, were burned to death last night and two others so badly burned that they are not expected to live.
