



SAYS MEN ROBBED

HER OF HER MONEY WHILE SHE SLEPT

Three cases were heard in the police court yesterday afternoon. Rosie Magglio was the complainant against Mrs. Nasta Patrick, another Russian woman, who was the interpreter. The complainant testified that she had earned money while working on the stage, and on Friday last had met a brother-in-law of the defendant who took her to the defendant's house. There she met three or four men and they had a drink of wine together. Feeling sleepy she laid down on a bed and had at the time the sum of one hundred and forty-eight dollars

in her possession. The men had left the house, and the complainant said that she then found her money had been taken.

Detective McLaughlin gave evidence that the complainant had been in the police station on Friday last, and had with her the sum of money as mentioned above. She was allowed to go with the promise that she would leave the city on the Pacific express for Montreal. It was too late for her to catch the train, however, that afternoon and it was expected that she would go away on Saturday.

The defendant was sent up for trial, but was allowed out on bail being furnished by two brothers and the interpreter.

Methodist Conference Session of Tuesday Opened By President.

DEVOTIONAL SERVICES

Audited Report of Board of Trustees is Presented.

The sessions of the Methodist conference opened yesterday morning at 9 o'clock with President Ople in the chair.

Devotional service was held during which the Rev. L. J. Mason delivered an address on "The Teaching of Jesus Concerning Prayer."

The report of the General Conference Fund was received, and owing to a deficiency of \$300 a discussion followed regarding the advisability of forcing circuits to pay their respective assessments. The treasurer reported that the amount paid into the fund were as follows:

The report of the committee on church property recommended:

1. That the request of the Hampton Board to sell a certain piece of land, the proceeds to be applied toward the erection of a hall, be complied with.

2. That the request from the Trustee Board of the St. Andrew's church for permission to sell a piece of land in that town formerly used as a burial place, in view of the possibility of legal and other difficulties, be not complied with.

The Sunday school committee in submitting their report presented to the conference the following recommendation received by them from the Charlottetown district:

"Attention is called to the schedule heading, directing that the Sunday school year close on April 30, and the District recommends that the Conference make this date for the closing of the Sunday school year a standing order."

The committee also expressed regret at the departure of the members taking teachers' training course, and recommended that superintendents of circuits be requested to give this aspect of the work special attention during the year.

The motion that the name of the Superintendent of the Gagetown Circuit be substituted for that of Rev. J. K. King in respect to the sale of church property to the Valley Railway was adopted.

The report of the Educational Committee was submitted, in which it was recommended that J. M. Palmer be elected Conference Treasurer. The committee further recommended that the following probationers be appointed to attend Mt. Allison University: G. Stanley Helms, W. J. Donville, G. T. Metherall, Robert Smart and John Whitman; that the account of Rev. A. D. McCully, secretary of the Board of Examiners, amounting to \$5.75, be paid.

The Rev. W. H. Barracough was nominated as the representative of the Conference to the Congregational Union soon to be held.

The report of the Enrollment Committee was adopted. The committee reported that the attendance at this Conference had been the largest in years. The total attendance was 171, including 107 ministers and probationers, 66 laymen and eight visitors. The report of the Laymen's Mis-

KAISER'S ENVOY AS HE BID FAREWELL TO AMERICA

His mission to America deemed an utter failure, Dr. Dernburg, self-styled Ambassador from the Kaiser, bade farewell to the United States by waving his hand from the upper deck of the Bergensfjord, of the Norwegian-American line, as the vessel left its pier at New York. There were only a few of the faithful present to speed him on his journey to Norway, whence he will proceed to his native land. Dr. Dernburg appeared cheerful, but pale of countenance. He carried with him a guarantee of safe conduct by the Allies. There were many Germans who pretended they did not think he would leave and who asserted the report that he had booked passage on board a Norwegian steamship was just a "newspaper yarn." However, he's gone.

The evening session of the conference yesterday convened at 8:15 p. m. with the president presiding and Rev. J. J. Weddall offering a prayer.

Mrs. (Rev.) J. B. Gough representing the Women's Missionary Society addressed the conference in the interests of that body. She brought the greetings of the ladies to the session and in the course of her remarks said that in spite of the war and financial depression they had succeeded in raising the sum of \$13,400.77 in the Province of New Brunswick an increase of \$165 over last year. She also gave an excellent idea of the work which the society was carrying on in the province.

Women Are Loyal.

Mrs. Sanford, president of the New Brunswick branch of the Women's Missionary Society, followed with an address in which she referred to the loyalty of the women of the organization, which she represented, and the sacrifices they had made notwithstanding the war. She also paid a tribute to the ministers who have helped them in the work and also the work which they had contributed in aid of the ministers. She ended with a further plea for co-operation on the part of the church with the society for the betterment of mankind.

Service Extension Is Discussed By Municipal Council

The Municipal Council in special session, yesterday, considered the matter of sewerage extensions in Lancaster. After a discussion lasting nearly three hours, it was decided to allow further consideration to rest over till the next meeting on July 18.

G. G. Murdoch, C.E., presented plans covering the work to be undertaken and in a resolution adopted and approved. The plan he adopted and put forward a bond issue of \$11,000 be sanctioned in order that the Lancaster Sewer Board might carry out the scheme. While the question was fully considered and many councillors spoke in favor of the work, the idea of putting further consideration over till the next meeting was generally favored and this was adopted.

Those present at the special session were Warden McLellan, Councillors Prink, Wigmore, Russell, Potts, Golding, Dean, Bannock, Smith, Howard, Carr, Shillington, Thompson, O'Brien, Stevens and Bryant, with the county secretary.

Warden McLellan explained that the meeting had been called solely for the purpose of considering the plans for the sewerage extension in Lancaster. The matter had been brought up at the last regular meeting but on account of several of the city representatives being absent the matter was put over for a special meeting. In order to construct the sewer a bond issue would be necessary and that was one of the questions to be considered especially at this time.

G. G. Murdoch, C.E., was present and the council went into committee to hear him and look over the plans submitted to them.


Mr. Murdoch explained that the sewerage extension in Lancaster was a very important matter and that it was necessary to have a bond issue in order to carry out the work. up the amount in arrears a blanket additional tax could be levied for next year, and then the amount could be made up."

There was some question as to the means of collecting the rates next year but it was pointed out that collections would be easier.

Councillor Wigmore—"These sewers are absolutely necessary. The city has been polluted with sewage from the county for some time. I am pleased that this move is being made. Dr. Melvin, the medical health officer, has often spoken to me concerning the conditions in this district and I feel that this work is absolutely necessary."

Councillor O'Brien—"As far as this amount of \$1,800 goes I think it has not been put absolutely in its right place. While it is true that there was this amount uncollected during the last three years we must also remember that there is \$2,000 in a maintenance fund which might be used to wipe out this amount. This \$2,000 was raised from the fees charged for entrance to the sewers and it might very well be put in the sinking fund. This amount shows that the present sewers are paying their way."

Secretary Kelley—"The maintenance fund was provided by legislature and was made up of sewer entrance fees." Councillor Wigmore—"In the city we have a sewer maintenance fund but we use it for the construction of sewers. I would like to know what will be done with the Lancaster maintenance fund. Will it be left to accumulate? The breakage in sewers is covered by assessment from year to year. It is seldom that a sewer needs repairing after it has been once laid."

Commissioner Potts suggested that the matter be left over till the next meeting.


Councillor O'Brien—"At the last meeting the matter was brought up and the councilman present favored the scheme and a special meeting was suggested on account of Councillors Prink, Wigmore and Potts being absent."

Councillor Prink—"I was present at the last meeting and when the session was nearly completed I asked the warden if there was anything more of importance. He replied that there was nothing he knew of. I did notice some juggling at the end tables but nothing was said and after I had retired this matter of sewer extension was brought up."

Warden McLellan—"At the last meeting the sewer matter was not on the order of business for the day and I told Councillor Prink that I knew of nothing further coming up and when the matter was introduced and only allowed an informal discussion. It was then decided to leave it over to a special meeting."

Councillor O'Brien introduced a resolution to embody the suggestion of the engineer in a resolution. This was seconded. Councillor Potts then moved that the matter be left over till the next meeting. This was also seconded. Then Councillor O'Brien offered an amendment to the amendment that the Lancaster sewer board be empowered to carry on the work and that a bond issue for \$11,000 be sanctioned. This amount was made up of \$500 bonds at five per cent. to run for a term of forty years. This was also seconded but on the vote it was lost and it was decided to take the matter up at the next meeting.

Councillor Prink—"Surely the councillor does not put a proposition such as that before this board. A forty year bond at five per cent. is absurd."
