Hangs Himself in Bedroom
After Seeing Movie Version
of Mark Twain Book.

SISTER FOUND BODY IN HIS BEDROOM

Visit of Children from Hart-
ford, Conn., Leads to Death
of Lad Seeking Health.

New York, April 6.—Thomas Hop-
kins, 15, and his sister Catherine, 12,
said goodbye to their father and
mother, Dr. and Mrs. Thos. N. Hop-
kins of 873 Laurel street, Hartford,
Conn., four days ago and came to New
York city to see the sights.

Thomas and his sister found a
heavily veiled waiting for them at
the home of Mrs. Sarah Towle, 25
Charlton street, a friend of the fam-
ily. The boy was delighted to have
as his own a bedroom on the third
floor of the old-fashioned little rou-
brick house. The room had a sloping
roof, rafters and other old time ap-
paratus.

Had A Fine Time.

During the days that followed the
city's sights were viewed enthusias-
tically by Thomas and Catherine. Re-
latives and friends took them around,
and they saw the metropolis and the
surrounding towns from the tower of
the Woodworth Building. Thomas was
a nervous, high-strung boy and the
trip was intended to divert him as
much as possible. His temperament
had made it necessary to take him
from school several times, but on his
visit here Thomas was in high
spirits.

One treat which both children were
looking forward to was to see of the
series A Yankee at the Court of
King Arthur, the film version of
Mark Twain's famous book. To the
meal love of the humorist whose
stories delighted boys and girls as
well as adults, Thomas and Catherine
added a personal knowledge of Mark
Twain's life. Only a short distance

peration, despairing measures were
tried, the police summoned and Dr.
Tandy called from St. Vincent's Hos-
pital. He said the boy had been dead
four or five hours.

The body will be cremated.

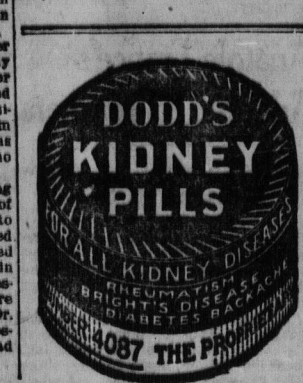
River Mystery Is Cleared Up

Body Found in Lake St. Fran-
cis Identified — Missing
Since Last December.

Cornwall, April 6.—The body of the
man found by an Indian in a boat at
the head of Cat Island, in Lake St.
Francis, has been identified by Mrs.
Catherine Jones of Massena, as that
of her son, Norman Henry, as well
as by Henry's wife. Henry had been
missing since the night of December
third last, when he and Lorne McMil-
lan, of Millie Roches, left the latter
place to row across the little river
to Barnhart's Island. McMillan's
body was recovered a couple of weeks
ago and the finding of Henry clears
the mystery up completely.

When discovered by the Indian, the
body lay face downward in the boat
and the black fur coat which Henry
wore was on the body, fully buttoned
and the collar turned up. A rubber
boot was on one foot, but the other
foot was bare, both the boot and sock
being missing. This circumstance
has not been accounted for. The boat
was a flat-bottomed, pointed punt,
and was nearly filled with water. In
the inside coat pocket on the dead
man was found \$25 in Canadian and
\$15 in American currency.

The boat was towed to Fraser's
Point and Coroner C. J. Hamilton, of
Cornwall, was notified, but did not
deem an inquest necessary. The body
was taken to Massena for interment.
Henry is survived by his wife and
four children, the oldest eleven years
and the youngest six months, also by
his mother and one sister. He was a
son of the late Addison Henry and
was born in Antwerp, Ont. He was
24 years of age.

Annunciation Given in St.
Mark's-in-the-Bowwerie.

RECTOR DEFENDS THE PERFORMANCE

Declares Performance Holy—
Dancers, Barefooted, Wear
White Satin Draperies.

New York, April 6.—Before six
barefooted young women appeared in
the Protestant Episcopal church of
St. Mark's-in-the-Bowwerie Sunday af-
ternoon in the ritual dance of the
Della Robbia Annunciation, Dr. Wm.
N. Guthrie, the rector, asked the con-
gregation to bear witness to the fact
that a dance was a holy thing no mat-
ter what misunderstanding may get
abroad. The rector outlined the thesis
of the dance, declaring emphatically:
"If you do not know that a dance can
be religious, the fault is yours, not
mine—a fault in your culture."
Positive ignorance and prejudices
have made many believe that
God will be happy if the church is
closed to everything except that which
which bore, Dr. Guthrie continued.
"But I believe the church should be
open to everything that will bring
men joy," he added.

Wore Satin Draperies.

Those who saw the dances and in-
cluded in this number were news-
paper reporters who had been espe-
cially invited to "see for themselves
and not get their information from
hearsay"—made no criticism of it as
a violation of the sanctity of the
church. The dancers were barefooted,
but not barelegged. The young
women wore simple, white satin dra-
peries, but their costumes were not
diaphanous.

Before the dance the sanctuary was
velled with curtains which harmon-
ized in tone with the date upon which
the dance was given. The dolls were
directly in front of the first pews, and
the dance could be seen from every
seat in the church. As the sanctuary
was velled the organ played "Ave
Marie," and as it was unveiled after
the dance Handel's Largo was played
on the harp.

forts of James Cross, negro porter of
the Winter Garden Drug Store, at
